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Intermediate Play-Off Series

Drawing Large Crowds

Combines Troupe Malton 7 - 2 Monday After Tie Game Last Thursday—To-morrow's Game may be Deciding Factor for League Championship.

The Norval-Georgetown Combines have certainly struck their stride, and at the moment it looks doubtful whether Malton will be able to hold up under the onslaught of the attacking Red and White. In the last three games the Combines have drawn two wins and a tie, which augur well for the next play-off affair, and which is a far cry from the outset of the season's play.

No doubt to-morrow's game at the Arena will be one of the highlights of the hockey season, with Malton smarting under the trouncing of Monday night's game, and the local team are eager to annex a group championship and continue further into the O.H.A. playdowns. It is hoped, however, that they will not underestimate the ability of the Malton team.

After three hectic periods of good fast hockey last Thursday, the first game of the Intermediate 'A' group play-offs ended in a 3-all tie. No overtime was played, as there is no ruling for this in play-off games.

The Combines went out in the lead of the two-out-of-three game series on Monday night of this week when they defeated the rival Malton squad 7 - 2. The visitors were handicapped in the first and second periods when they ran into a number of well-deserved penalties. They were carrying high sticks with a chip on their shoulder and the referee was quick to penalize the offending players and thus kept the game well in hand. The locals played a fairly clean game.

Feeling ran high through the large crowd of spectators, when in the first period Referee Patterson called back a Georgetown goal. To some it looked like a sure thing, but the referee said he called it as he saw it. Both teams scored in this period, Schertz getting the first goal of the game, and eight minutes later Montgomery tied it up.

The Combines had a field day in the second period scoring four times. This break for the Combines was probably due to the penalty box being stacked with Maltonites. This scoring spree gave the team a lot of confidence and they finished off the game with a couple more counters in the third period. Malton added their other goal in the second period.

Bill Richardson played well in the local net, while Malton's change in goalies looked slightly weaker. Both forward lines kept up a fast pace, but the visiting defence was somewhat disorganized as the Combines bore in regularly on the net.

HIGH SCHOOL INSPECTORS' REPORT

Report of Inspectors W. A. Jennings and R. H. Wallace, December 1, 1944. Accommodation - No changes in accommodations have been made since the previous inspection. The building is maintained in a reasonably good state of repair and the caretaker is co-operating well to keep it clean. The school lacks the modern facilities whereby an up-to-date high school can be carried on. It is without an Assembly room and gymnasium as well as the accommodation for the teaching of Agriculture, Shop Work and Household Science.

Organization and Administration - The total enrolment is slightly larger than that of last year. However, none of the classes are too large and teachers are given opportunity to watch the progress of the individual pupil and to ensure adequate attention to the special needs of any. Provision has been made for one period a week for Education Guidance in Grade IX. Progress should be made for the reception of the broadcasts related to this subject.

We discussed with the Principal the fact that the allotment of time for teaching English falls short of that recommended in the regulations. In general, however, we feel that he has considered the needs of the pupils and the capabilities of the teachers in planning the time-table.

Instruction - In general the teaching observed was of good quality. The teachers had made definite plans for the lesson, covered and were endeavoring to present the work so as to stimulate interest and effort on the part of the pupils.

The pupils are trained to appreciate the importance of neatness and system in their written records. Diagrams and outline maps are being employed to advantage. The teachers realize the value of clear, oral answers and are meeting with a good measure of success in obtaining these. Remarks and Recommendations - Mr. Carpenter continues to administer the affairs of the school capably. On the whole, his organization of the programme of studies is designed to meet the special requirements of the pupils.

He is receiving satisfactory co-operation from the teachers and student body. This school did not open this year until September 22nd. Taking this into consideration, satisfactory progress is being made in covering the courses. The teachers realize the importance of dealing thoroughly with the topics selected rather than striving to cover every detail of the syllabus of each subject.

The total enrolment is 120 made up of 52 boys and 68 girls. Of the 120 students enrolled, there are 72 town students and 44 Halton County students, and 4 students from other counties.
