DOMINION STORE SALES UP

The sales of Dominion Stores Limited for the calendar year 1944 were \$2,888,434.00 compared with \$2,785,551.00 for the same period ending December 1943. MRS. J. C. MACKAY SPEAKS AT NAVY LEAGUE CONCERT

Speaking at the Navy League concert, held at the Oddfellows' Hall on Tuesday, Feb. 13th, Mrs. J. C. Mackay, of Toronto secretary of the Navy League of Canada, Women's Committee of the Province of Ontario, urged that no slackening of efforts in this vital war work be shown because of optimistic war news, but to carry on to the end of hostilities, supplying the life-line to victory. Speaking of the various ranches of Navy League work, Mrs. Mackay stated that the ditty bag contribution alone had increased from year to year by leaps and bounds with some 1500 bags filled in 1939 and the 1944 total reaching some 58,000 with seamen of 43 nationalities receiving these comforts. She stressed the need for more woollens, more fur for vests, as well as continued interest in the work of the league by all. She commended the work done for Sea Cadets, who supply a good percentage of well-trained fighting men of the seas, and technicians. She spoke highly of the assistance being given merchant seamen of all the Allied Nations, by this organization.

Mr. J. P. Hagerman, of Toronto, Field representative of the Navy League of Canada, spoke briefly on the men's department of the league and he, too, stressed the need of more and more assistance in each and every organization in order to supply these unsung heroes of the sea every need and comfort in their gallant fight for us.

Councillor S. W. Orr, as chairman, introduced the talent, which was largely local with the exception of a demonstration by six members of the Canadian Sea Cadets Corps Ajax of Guelph, which was led by Chief Petty Officer Bob Nash and included Petty Officers C. Crowe, G. Whetstone and W. Amos, also Leading Seaman A. Cremasco and E. Sutton, and a movie film, entitled "Freighters Under Fire", presented by technician A. Green of Guelph. Other numbers were: musical numbers by Georgetown's Rhythmic Rubes; vocal numbers by Misses Marion Hepburn and Mary Moyer; vocal (with variations) by comedians Harry Hale and A. Dewhurst; accordion selections by Harry Dewhurst (with a community sing-song); dances by Gertrude Cain and two of her dancing pupils, Dianne Hillock and Marlene Bludd; concluded by request hymns for some of our local heroes by the Ladies' Committee convenor, Mrs. W. Mendham, who also convened the concert, followed by The King.

The local executive wishes to thank all who contributed towards making the concert so entertaining and generally successful with special mention to Sam Mackenzie for the fine temporary platform and to all the talent for their services, "absolutely gratis," to the Navy League.

CHARLES H. NIXON DIED ON FEBRUARY 10th

Mr. Charles H. Nixon, who had not been enjoying the best of health for a considerable time past, passed away at Peel Memorial Hospital Saturday night, Feb. 10th, where he had been a patient only one day. The late Mr. Nixon was born on the tenth line Norval, and carried on farming as his occupation until he moved into Norval village thirty-five years ago, where he carried on labouring until he was compelled to retire owing to ill health. The late Mr. Nixon, who was 77 years of age, was a son of the late John and Mrs. Nixon, two of the early settlers of the Norval district. In religion he was of the United faith, and for many years was a member of the L.O.L. at Glen Williams. He was unmarried and has no survivors, he being the last member of a large family. The funeral took place Tuesday afternoon under L.O.L. auspices. Rev. F. J. Dunlop, of Norval United Church was the officiating minister at the Brampton Funeral Home, and also conducted the service at Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval, where the remains were laid to rest in a profusion of beautiful floral tributes.

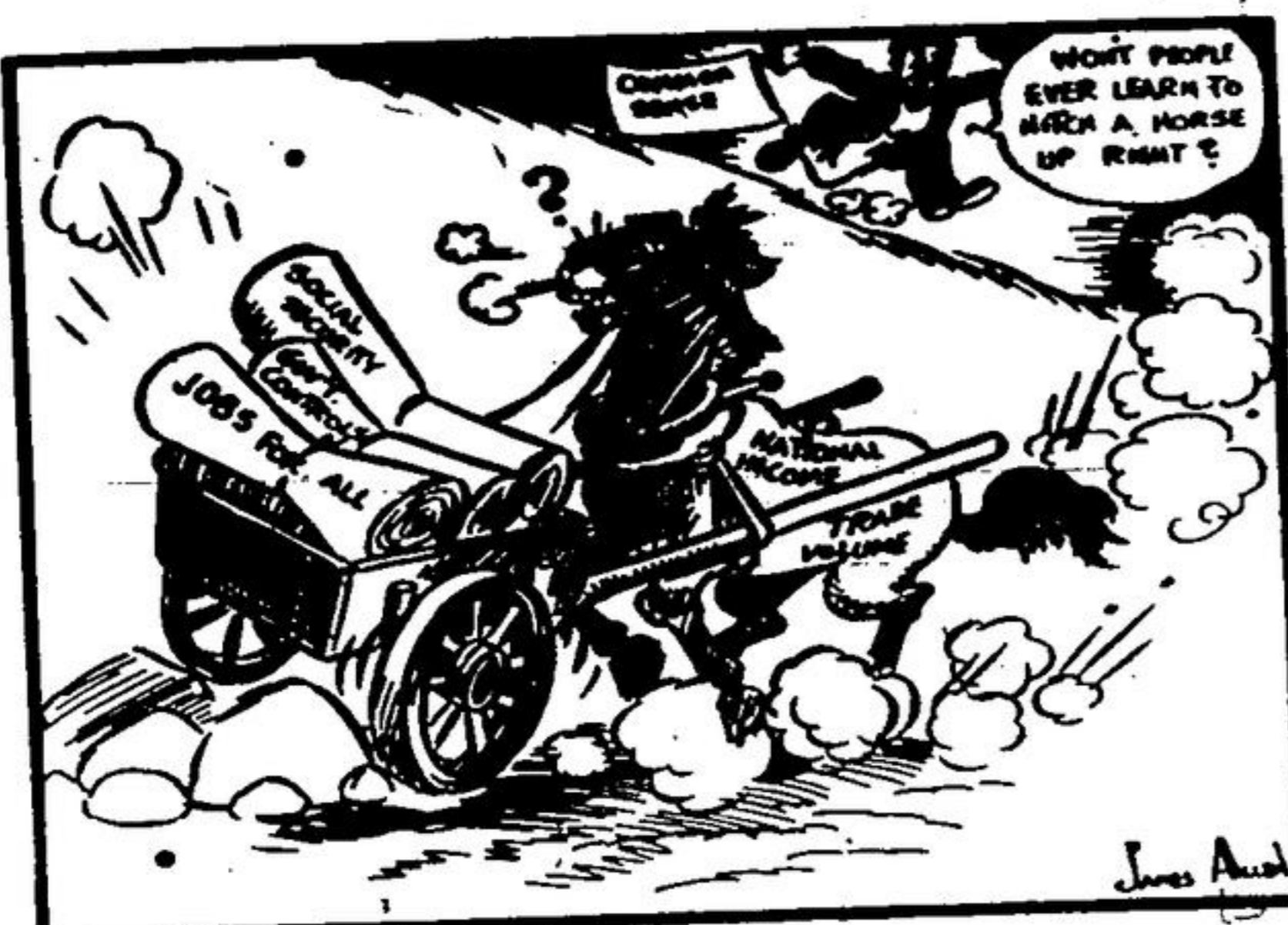

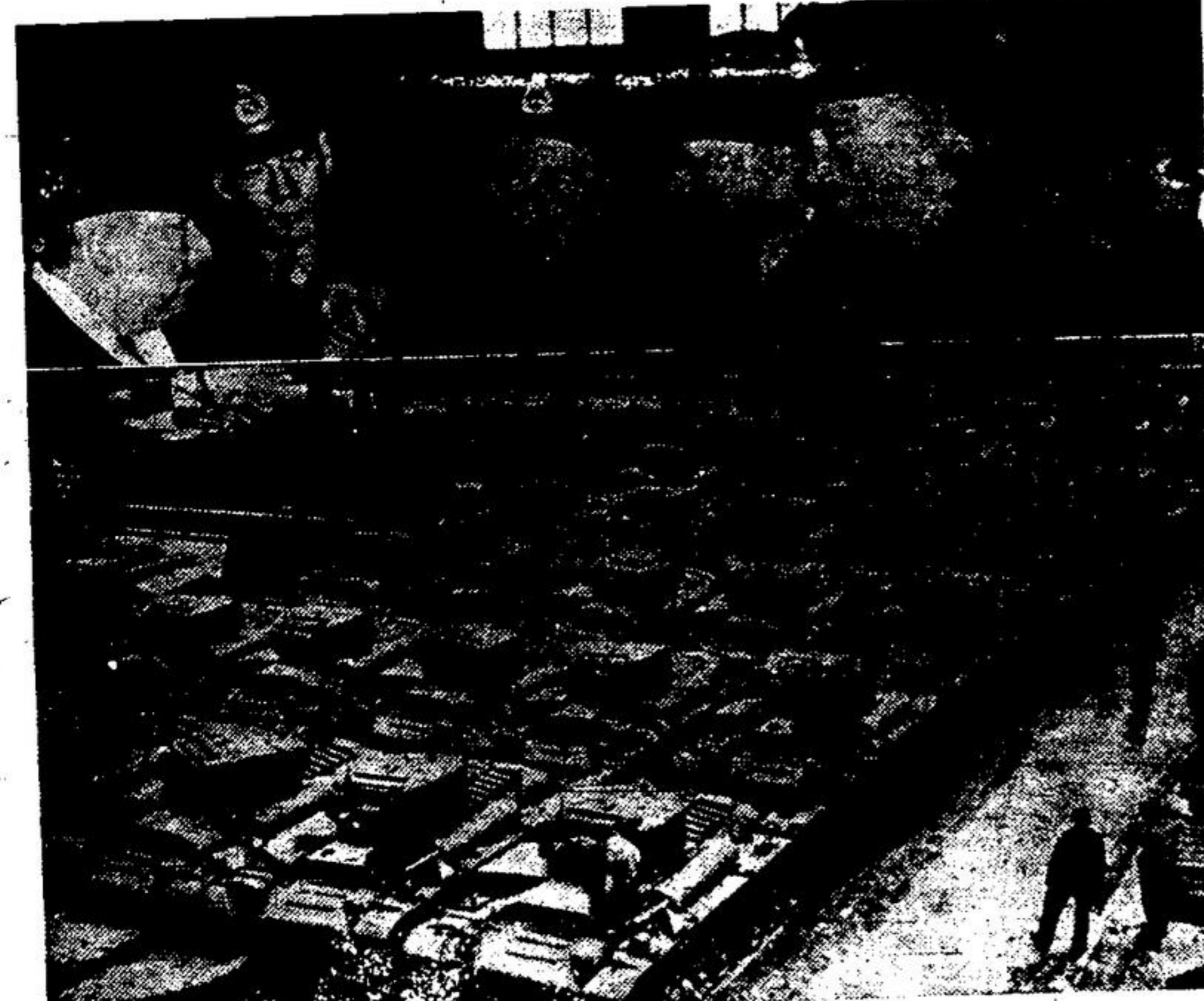

Lieut.-Gen. McNaughton Inspects C.P.R. Tanks



THE stepped-up tempo of tank production at Angus Shops, Montreal, was evident everywhere when Lieut.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton made a detailed inspection of the big Canadian Pacific plant, whose machinery is turning out increasing numbers of medium weight "Valentines" for the armed forces.

Accompanied by ranking officials of the Canadian Army and senior officers of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Canada's No. 1 soldier received a first hand picture of tank construction from the smallest parts to the finished product. He displayed keen interest in the construction of the speedy war machines, a type that has been highly praised by the Russians on the field of battle.

Highlight of General McNaughton's visit followed the shops inspection when six of the khaki-painted "Valentine" tanks, fresh from the Angus shops assembly line, raced out on the shops Midway, where they wheeled, plunged, and went through various other tactics to show their maneuverability.
