Tend your stove and furnace cor-Lemon Juice Recipe Checks rectly. The more a stove is dampered down, the higher the carbon monoxide content in the smoke. When banking the fire for the night leave it with enough draught to keep it free burning and to draw off all amoke. Be on the alert when you smell smoke in the
