POISON FUMES KILL MANY ON HOME FRONT

During the winter season a very real danger to human life is increased. This is the danger of poisoning by carbon monoxide gas caused by defective heating systems in the home.

"In respect to carbon monoxide poisoning, one can never be too vigilant nor too cautious," says Dr. Blackler of the Division of Industrial Hygiene, Ottawa.

The commonest sources of carbon monoxide are smoke from coal fires and exhaust gases from cars. The gas kills by uniting with the red corpuscles of the blood and preventing them from carrying oxygen to the cells of the body.

The insidious thing about carbon monoxide is that a person can neither see nor smell it. It gives no warning until almost too late. The symptoms of headache and shortness of breath do not usually appear until the victim's blood has become 20 per cent saturated with the poison gas, and soon after that a characteristic apathy prevents him from doing anything to save himself. If not rescued by outside aid, unconsciousness and death soon follow.

A person who has been overcome by gas must be rushed into fresh air. If breathing has stopped, give artificial respiration and move carefully to a hospital where he may be placed in an oxygen tent and given blood transfusions.

The best treatment, of course, is prevention. Make your stove and furnace proof against carbon monoxide leaks. Check for cracked fire pot, and defective doors, replace worn or corroded parts, check stovepipes for rust spots, loose joints, soot. Keep chimney clean.

Tend your stove and furnace correctly. The more a stove is damped down, the higher the carbon monoxide content in the smoke. When banking the fire for the night leave it with enough draught to keep it free burning and to draw off all smoke. Be on the alert when you smell smoke in the house.

NEW DRUG SAVES LIVES

Britain's supremacy over Germany in surgical skill, particularly in the use of penicillin, the "wonder drug" which was discovered by the British Scientists Florey and Fleming, and has since been developed by British medical research to such a high degree that between D-Day and October 31st, it saved the lives of three out of every four British and Canadian soldiers who received abdominal wounds.

2,712 genuine abdominal wound cases were treated during that period by British and Canadian forward surgeons. Only 759 patients died, giving

the recovery rate as 72 per cent, or three out of every four soldiers. Such figures have never before been produced.

One case quoted was that of a soldier wounded in the abdomen by two machine-gun bullets at 100-yard range. The English doctors did not operate on him, but gave him penicillin, bully beef and biscuits. He was back on duty within six weeks.
