A LETTER FROM HOLLAND
Mrs. Albert Stapleton has received a most interesting and reassuring letter from a Dutch family named Ruyppers, who have been very kind to her husband, Pte. Albert Stapleton, now serving in Holland with the Infantry. We reprint below, extracts from the letter because it expresses so well how the Dutch people feel about the Allied armies now fighting in their country.
Somewhere, Holland,
Feb. 3rd, 1945.

Dear Madam:
I cannot miss to write you some words as your Albert is just starting to write, and now I use the opportuni-

ty to write a letter to you.
In the first place, Madam, we and our other Dutchmen ought to thank the Allied army as the soldiers give their lives for our freedom, and also your Albert belongs to them.

We cannot thank you enough, Canadian people, for the things they have done for us, and will do for us. Albert is such a fellow, one of the men who exactly knows what they have to do for the Dutch people and we thank you for the second time.
We had many Canadians and we try as good as we can to amuse them and to give them a good home.

We hope that your Albert will amuse himself with us, and we will do our utmost to make it easy to him. We have much pleasure in the living room. Madam, the life we had here when the Germans were here in four and a half years was awful and terrible, and we cannot write it to you with a pen.

We hope the war will be finished soon and that Albert will soon be returned to you.
Now my dear Madam, I finish, and I wish you good luck, and give you my kind greetings from Holland.

In addition to this thoughtful letter, Mr. Ruyppers has sent hand-engraved spoons and coins to Pte. Stapleton's children, Sandra, Louise and Errol, as well as a pair of wooden shoes, and a brooch and bracelet to match, all made by himself. Pte. Stapleton served in Belgium for three weeks, and has been in Holland for five weeks.

DEATH OF SAMUEL FRANK

He had been in ill health for many months but was able to be about until a couple of weeks prior to his death when he was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, where he gradually weakened and word of his death was received on Saturday morning.
Mr. Frank who celebrated at a family gathering last August his 69th birthday had spent his entire life in Acton. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Christian Frank and in 1920 married Alexandra Bradford, who remains to mourn his loss.
