

VICTOR VANNATTER, GEORGETOWN NATIVE, SUCCUMBS TO HEART ATTACK

Victor Vannatter, a native of Georgetown who lived here for many years, died suddenly in his hotel room in Three Rivers, Quebec, on Tuesday, February 20th. A heart attack was the cause of his death.

As a young man living here in Georgetown, he learned his trade at the Dayfoot Shoe Company, later moving to Barrie where he continued as a shoe manufacturer until the war, when he was made an inspector of army shoes.

Surviving are his widow, the former Jean Sinclair, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Sinclair of Erin Township, two daughters, Jean and Minnie, of Barrie, and a son, Gordon, of Windsor. The funeral was held from his home in Barrie last Friday.

HAROLD WHEATLEY, FORMERLY OF NORVAL AND GEORGETOWN DIES SUDDENLY

The sudden death of Mr. Harold Wheatley, in Port Stanley on Sunday morning, February 26th, came as a shock to his many friends in Georgetown and Norval. Mr. Wheatley had been very ill at the first of the year, but had apparently recovered, when he suddenly passed away. He was in his 46th year.

Born in Norval, he was the only child of the late Mary Callahan and Thomas Wheatley. He attended school in Norval and Georgetown High School. Working in the bank at first, he later had a restaurant business on Mill Street for a number of years after his marriage to the former Ethel Thompson, of Georgetown. Mr. and Mrs. Wheatley and family have been living in Port Stanley for some time, where the late Mr. Wheatley was connected with the Imperial Oil Co. Ltd.

He leaves to mourn his loss his widow and two children, Mary, at home, and Williams of the R.C.N.V.R. Ottawa. The funeral was held at 2.30 on Wednesday afternoon, from his late residence in Port Stanley.
