T. APPEYARD ONE OF HALTON'S TOP HOG PRODUCERS
 Who is Halton's leading hog producer? This is a question which is hard to answer, but we do know that among the toppers is Mr. Thos. E. Appeyard, R. R. 1 Georgetown, who scored 89% A's in a total of 688 hogs marketed in 1944.
 Some interesting statistics have recently been released, showing that the "A" average for Ontario last year was 35.5%, for Canada 28.2%, and for Halton County 40.7%. While some Halton producers scored as high as 75.1%, the number of animals marketed must be taken into account and Mr. Appeyard marketed well above the average number of hogs.

REV. R. C. TODD SPEAKS TO LOCAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN
 Rev. R. C. Todd was guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Local Council of Women, held on Friday, March 16th, in the Municipal Building. Choosing as his subject "Religious Teaching in the Schools," Mr. Todd said that now, with the Protestant churches approving religious instruction in the schools, we have at last attained what it was originally intended our school system should be—"Christianity is to democracy as the heart is to the body," he pointed out, "and any educational system which leaves out religious instruction is incomplete."
 The president, Mrs. R. T. Paul, opened the meeting with silent prayer, following which Mrs. Ralph Ross read a paper on conditions among the lepers. She pointed out the dire need of funds and the inability of present help to Japanese-occupied countries such as Korea, Formosa, China and Burma. A donation of \$5.00 was voted to the Leper Mission.

SHERIFF HAMPSHIRE GUEST SPEAKER AT LIONS CLUB

W. J. L. Hampshire, of Milton, sheriff for Halton County, was the guest speaker at a dinner meeting of the Georgetown Lions Club, held Monday evening in the McGibbon House.
