Previously reported missing on February 19th, Pte. William H. Bakh has now been officially reported killed in action in Germany on that date. This was the sad news which reached Pte. Bakh's sister, Mrs. Vaughan Bedell, in Georgetown this week.

Born in Somerset, England, he came to Canada with his family in 1877, settling in New Brunswick and later moving to Ontario with Mrs. Bedell,

with whom he made his home until his enlistment early in September, 1939. He had seen service in France, Belgium and Holland, doing advance patrol duty with the Essex Scottish Regiment. He would have celebrated his 38th birthday on March 29th. Surviving are his parents and youngest sister at Hornby, two sisters in New Brunswick and Mrs. Bedell in Georgetown.
