THOMAS MCCLURE DIED OF PNEUMONIA

The death of Thomas McClure, last remaining member of a well-known pioneer family, occurred in St. Joseph General Hospital, on Thursday, April 14th. A son of the late Samuel and Marion McClure, he was one of a family of seven. His demise was caused by lobar pneumonia.

The late Mr. McClure was born in St. John Township, and farmed all his life in that district. For the past two years he had been living in Ballinafad. He was unmarried, and in his 75th year.

The funeral service was held on Monday, April 16th, from the McClure Funeral Home, by the Rev. A. O. W. Foreman of Ballinafad United church. Interment was in Glen Williams cemetery.

CPL. LORNE BARROW HOME AFTER FIVE YEARS OVERSEAS

Cpl. Lorne Barrow arrived at his home in Stewarttown on Tuesday afternoon, April 17th, after having served overseas for five years with the Royal Canadian Engineers. He is home for a 30-day rotation leave. He was welcomed by the newly formed Stewarttown Reception Committee, and his home was decorated for the happy occasion.

Cpl. Barrow has seen service in England, Gibraltar, Holland, Belgium, and Kiev, Germany. He enlisted in 1940, and trained at Exhibition Barracks, Toronto, before proceeding overseas.

Town Council Take First Steps Toward New Vote on Sewage

A week ago last Monday Georgetown Council held a special meeting to discuss plans for taking another vote on a proposed sewage disposal system for Georgetown.

Mr. C. R. Hagey, of the C. R. Hagey Engineering Co., of Port Erie, was present and gave Council members some important facts necessary before bringing the matter once again before the ratepayers. A vote on a proposed sewage system was taken in 1937, but was defeated by a narrow margin.

Mayor Harold Cleave, in introducing Mr. Hagey to Council, said he believed the ratepayers were now ready to accept this long overdue necessity, and he was convinced we should take this vote as soon as possible.

Mr. Hagey advised Council that the levels taken and shown on a map which was made in 1937 was necessary, and with a few revisions in estimates Council could get to work on the project at once.

A couple of points arising out of the discussion, in regard to sewage from local industry, will be taken before the Provincial Sanitary Inspector, Dr. Berry, and his decision on the matter presented to Council at a meeting in the near future.

As soon as Council have the matter of sewage disposal clearly set forth in their own minds, the ratepayers will be given the details through the press and public meetings.

ILLNESS FATAL TO H. MATTHEWS, FORMER GEORGETOWN RESIDENT, IN STRATFORD

His friends in Georgetown were saddened to hear of the death in Stratford General Hospital on Monday, April 16th, of Harry Walter Matthews, after an illness of two weeks' pneumonia. He had been suffering from pneumonia. During his few years residence in Georgetown, prior to moving to Stratford three years ago, he was well and favourably known. He was a faithful church worker at St. George's Church, where he was a member of the Choir, along with his wife and sons. While in Georgetown, the family made their home on Murdoch Street, and Mr. Matthews was employed with the Dominion Seed House.

He was born in Upton-on-Severn, England 72 years ago, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Matthews, and came to Canada in 1914, settling first in the West, then in Brampton and Georgetown. A gardener by trade, he was employed in Stratford with his brother-in-law, Mr. J. Wainwright in the Guthrie Greenhouses. In 1921, he was married to the former Lily Pike.

A member of Brampton Lodge, Sons of England, and the Masonic Order, he was a member of St. Paul's Church of England, Stratford, and served on the Board of Management of the Church. Surviving besides his wife are two sons, Henry and Robert both at home, a daughter, Mrs. F. Greene, Vancouver, B.C., a brother, James Albert Matthews in South Africa, and two sisters, Mrs. Florence Hunt and Mrs. J. White, in England. There is one grandson, Robert Greene, Vancouver. One son, Frederick, died ten years ago.

The funeral service was held on Wednesday from St. Paul's Church, Rev. M. H. H. Parr officiating. Burial was in Avondale Cemetery, Stratford.

FIRE AT DAVIDSON HOME ON JOHN STREET

On Wednesday evening last, at about 6 p.m., the Fire Brigade was called to extinguish a fire at the home of Mr. Jack Davidson, John Street.

The blaze had started in the rear of the house; in the part occupied by Mr. A. (Scotty) Johanson.
