

County Organizers Meet With Local Loan Committee

Mr. W. N. Bickle and Squadron Leader Ken Andras, organizers for the 8th Victory Loan in Halton County, met with the local Loan Committee last Wednesday night in the Municipal Building.

The meeting was presided over by L. E. Fleck, joint chairman with W. F. Bradley for the Georgetown district loan drive. Mr. Bickle spoke briefly on the fine record in Halton for the last Loan, when the County had the highest per capita purchases in the whole Dominion, with Georgetown leading the Halton district. He praised the local committee for their splendid organization and said he was confident that this district would once more do its part in all-out support for a worthy cause.

Squadron Leader Andras, recently discharged from the RCAF after service overseas, spoke of publicity work for the Loan, and showed two excellent films—"Report to the Boys" with war correspondent Greg Clark and "The Price of Victory," produced by the Coca-Cola Company.

Sales Chairman E. V. MacCormack spoke briefly, and said that Georgetown's quota once more stood at \$335,000, but that Georgetown was out to beat its previous record of \$540,000 established in the 7th Loan campaign.

Jack arrived home on Friday last after five years spent in England and later in Germany. He was greeted on his arrival in Canada by his wife and daughter Alleen, who reside in Scarborough, and his mother and sister, Mrs. Mary Barclay, in Georgetown. Jack is renewing many old acquaintances during his visit to the old home town, and also took part in the memorial parade and service on Sunday in memory of President Roosevelt.

A potential soldier nearly all his life, Jack Kerr spent twenty years in the Territorials, later the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery at Kingston.
