**PTE. GEORGE GREENSWARD,
 PRISONER-OF-WAR
 SAFE IN ENGLAND**

Lieut. Gordon Boody also Liberated

Reassuring word came to Mrs. Geo. Greensward (nee Evelyn Sanderson), last Thursday, when she received a telegram from her husband, Pte. Geo. Greensward, telling her that he had been liberated from a German prisoner-of-war camp and had been repatriated to England.

Pte. Greensward was taken prisoner at Remini, Italy, last September. He has been overseas since October, 1942, with the Irish Regiment of Canada. His little daughter, Carol, was only three weeks old when he went to England, and she is looking forward to meeting her daddy.

Mrs. Greensward hadn't heard from her husband since January 15th. Official notification of Pte. Greensward's liberation came on Monday morning from the Director of Reception, Ottawa.

Taken prisoner at the same time as Pte. Greensward, was OWAC Helen Williams' fiancée, Lieut. Gordon Boody, and word was received on Saturday by Dr. and Mrs. C. V. Williams, that he too had been liberated, and was safe in the United Kingdom.

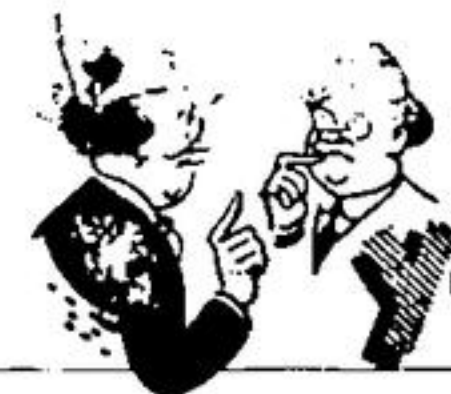
