Dear Friends:

While Victory is first and foremost in our minds and thankfulness in our hearts, let us face our new and most difficult task the post-war problems. As we approach the threshold of a new life let us try being gentle in our judgments and be frank and honest with ourselves and with each other, because men and women are strong only as they believe in one another, so let us march together over the threshold to a higher standard of living which can be attained only by a united effort.

We Liberals believe that a more abundant life lies within reach of the people of Ontario and Liberalism is one path by which this better way of life can be achieved.

We do not claim an ability to chart the future. Too much depends on world circumstances beyond Ontario's or Canada's control, but what we do claim is the ability to provide jobs and security for the people of Ontario in the years that lie ahead.

Our first duty concerns the man or woman coming home from the war, the rehabilitation program must be of the very best and drastic measures taken to see they are carried out. A system of universal health insurance is essential to relieve wage earners and salaried people of the constant fear of heavy medical and hospital bills.

The age requirements of old age pensions could be reduced, and the amount of payments could be increased; the aged must be provided for—they have given of their best. We must recognize the new stature which young people have earned for themselves during the war whether their services were contributed in the armed forces or in war industry. The Policy Committee of the Liberal party was unanimous in its belief that youth had proved itself through acceptance of high responsibility and through its willingness to make every sacrifice in its country's behalf.

In line with this thinking two main provisions were included in the Liberal platform as it affected our province, reduction of the voting age to 18, and creation of a youth department of the Provincial government. When people are old enough to fight, work and pay taxes they are old enough to vote as well. Without such legislation this ridiculous situation will arise; many young men and women who will exercise the vote this year will be temporarily disfranchised when they are a year older. Every one in the armed forces is regarded by law as of voting age, no matter what their actual age. Unless we change the law these 16-18 year old voters will lose their franchise the minute they are discharged from the service.
