VOTE AS YOU LIKE — BUT VOTE

Next Monday, June 4th, is the day on which Ontario voters go to the polls to decide what political group will guide the provincial destiny for the next four years. It is our democratic privilege that each and every qualified citizen has the right to mark a ballot for the candidate of his choice, in secrecy and safety.

(Merle) Mrs. Elwood Nodwell, Erin Township; Donald, in Toronto. A daughter (Emma Christina) Mrs. Robert Barbour predeceased him on April 20, 1945. He is also survived by seventeen grandchildren.

He was a member of Burns' Church Erin, and was on the Board of Managers for many years. A member of Wellington Lodge A.F. & A.M. Several years ago he served Erin Township as a Councillor for several terms and was a past President of Erin Agricultural Society.

The funeral took place from the home of his son, W. F. McEnery, on Tuesday afternoon to Burns' Church where his pastor, Rev. John McKenzie, assisted by Rev. W. D. Turner, of Hillsburgh, conducted the service, in the presence of a very large congregation. Interment was made in the family plot at Erin Cemetery. The pallbearers were: F. H. OKVILLE WOMAN ADDRESSES LOCAL CONSERVATIVE LADIES

"Protection of soldiers' wives and families, and security of their civil rights resulted, in a large degree, from protests made and action taken in the House of Commons by Progressive Conservative members, Mrs. Edwin J. Hallett, Okville, told a Georgetown women's meeting. Mrs. Hallett, deputy co-ordinator of women's activities for the Progressive Conservative Association in Ontario, spoke at the home of Mrs. Anne Lawson, Miss Sybil Bennett, was chairman.

With Gordon Graydon as House leader, the Progressive Conservative party had planned a fine rehabilitation program, Mrs. Hallett declared. The assumption on which the program was based, she said, was that only the best was worthy of returning service-

men and women. "Canadian women are being offered a big opportunity to work for the unity and advancement of our country through the Progressive Conservative Association," Miss Bennett said in a brief address. Women, she added, were being given an opportunity to obtain an equal status in the business world and in the home.
