TO THE ELECTORS OF HALTON COUNTY:

I promised that this week I would deal with the Liberal Party's position in regard to labour. The one question that I have heard many times oftener than any other during the campaign, is this, how is it that we can now find 5000 million dollars a year for war when only a few years ago we could not find enough money to pay decent relief payments and municipalities were going in default, provincial budgets were in the red and the federal budget was in the red? This question I will endeavour to answer. The reason we have been able to employ everyone in time of war is because of the fact that we had a market for every plane, tank, ship, gun, shell and other war equipment that we could produce, and we had a Minister of Finance who said that he would make financially possible the financing of every war product that it was physically possible for us to produce. As a result, we have reached full employment, though in doing so it was necessary to impose heavy taxation price control and rationing. So long as the Canadian people will unite with the same determination in peacetime to supply the highest standard of living possible to our people we can have full employment.

The key to the whole problem, in my opinion, is markets. If we maintain a sufficiently high standard of living in Canada to consume all of the civilian goods that we produce, for our own use plus our imports, then we will have a market which will result in full employment. The Liberal Party believes that the only way this domestic market, or some call it consumer buying power, can be maintained in peacetime, is to see that each of the three main groups, labour, agriculture and finance, receive their proper distributive share of the national income. My article last week gave the figures with respect to agriculture. This week I will deal with labour.

In the past, labour has not received its proper distributive share of the national income, with the result that we have not maintained consumer buying power at a sufficiently high level to consume the goods we can produce. The two instruments available to labour to insure fair treatment are collective bargaining and taxation.

Collective Bargaining is now an established fact, and since P.C. 1003 was passed, union membership has more than doubled. I would hope that we would soon see every worker—a union member and while in any new organization there are some opportunists and self-seekers who push themselves forward to prominent positions, I have no fear in regard to labour organizations. The heart of the Canadian workman is sound and these organizations will soon "weed out" any false leaders and opportunists.

Profit Sharing by Labour is in its infancy, but this feature will spread rapidly when the facts are known. I believe that labour makes—just as important a contribution to the production of goods as does capital and that labour should be taken into full partnership with capital. One of the best illustrations of which I am aware to show the sharp difference between the Liberal viewpoint and the Conservative viewpoint in regard to profits is one which I encountered while chairman of Subcommittee No. 1 on War Expenditures. This committee visited every aircraft plant in Canada. While visiting the Vickers plant at Montreal we were much impressed with its production record and with the efficiency of labour at that plant. On making inquiries we found the plant had a profit sharing with labor plan. Under that plan when labour became 75% efficient, from that period labour shared 50-50 with capital in the profits. We found as a result that many of the workmen at that plant were receiving additional bonus payments ranging from 10c to 25c per hour in addition to the standard wage rates. We also found that in spite of this profit sharing by labor production costs per plane were lower than at the other plants producing the same aircraft, and we found that their production record was higher. As a result we recommended that this scheme of profit sharing by labour should be introduced in all aircraft plants and this recommendation is now in the process of being carried out. When our recommendation came before the main committee it was supported by every Liberal, CCF and Social Credit member, but it was opposed by every Conservative member.

Taxation of excess profits should be imposed wherever excess profits are earned to the point where they result in a distribution of the national income which is harmful to our economy. Let me give you an illustration of the importance of distribution. Last year the national income, that is the total of all of our earnings, was \$18 billion. We collected from you

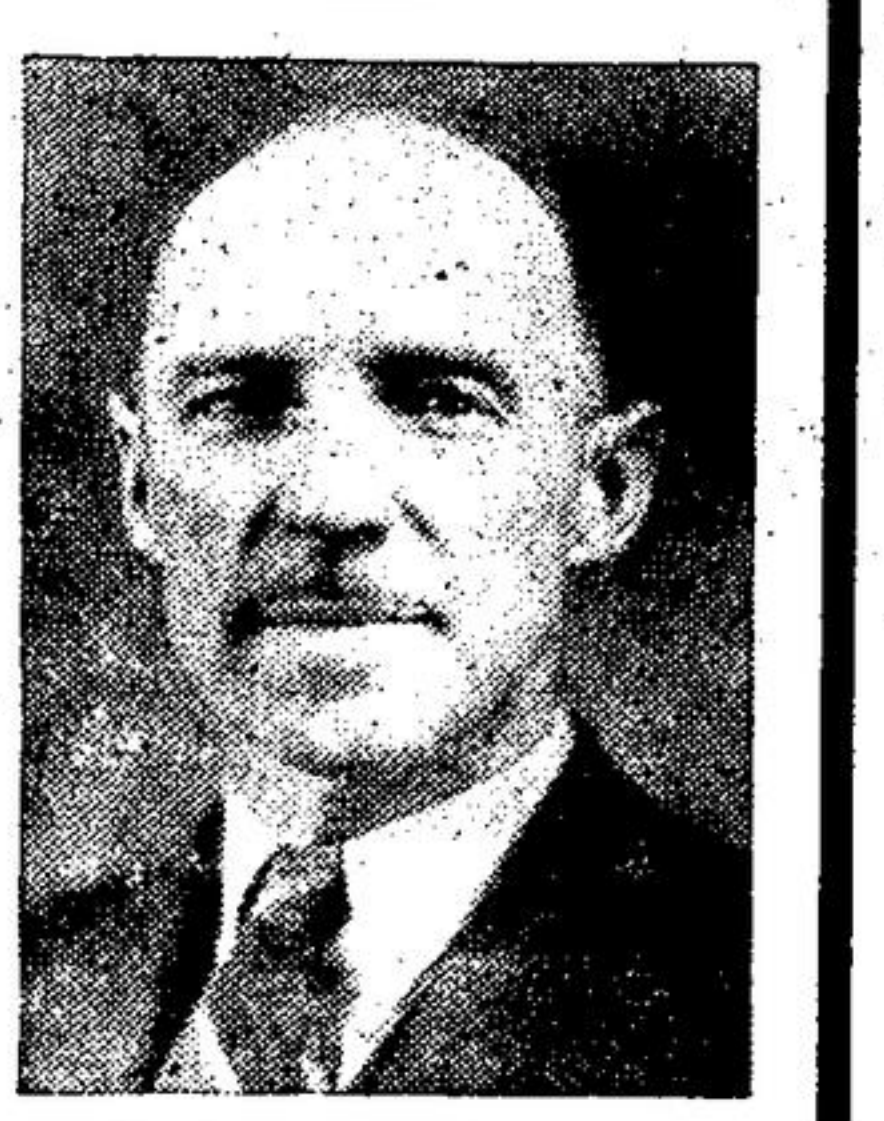

- MARKETING BOARDS**
Assist the farmers to set up Producer Marketing Boards for all major farm products.
- LIVE STOCK INDUSTRY**
Build up the live stock industry.
(a) Assist the farmers to gain control of the marketing of their live stock.
(b) Abolish the packers' deduction of \$1 a head on horned cattle, and replace it with a bonus to the farmer of \$1 a head on all cattle marketed without horns.
(c) Establish a system of grading live stock sales.
(d) Establish comprehensive veterinary services, including free inoculation against Bang's disease.
- HYDRO**
Rapidly extend Hydro throughout rural areas, and level out Hydro costs.
- ELECTRIC EQUIPMENT**
Install electric equipment on long-term credit through the facilities of the Ontario Hydro; sell other modern conveniences for the farm home on long-term credit through a Crown company.
- NORTHERN ONTARIO**
Appoint a Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Northern Ontario, with offices in the north.
- SOIL CONSERVATION**
Encourage soil conservation by farmers, by assuming a portion of the burden of delayed returns in revenue, together with a general soil conservation programme.
- HEALTH SERVICES**
Build a new system of health services to provide adequate medical, dental and hospital facilities for every person in rural Ontario; establish travelling health clinics.
- EDUCATION AND RECREATION**
Give special attention to rural education and recreation;
(a) Agricultural Vocational Schools will be set up in every county, and to these will be attached a demonstration farm and dormitories so that the discoveries of the experimental farms and the sciences of the colleges can be made known to the youth of the country, and can be demonstrated on the sort of farm to which the students will be returning.
(b) Short courses (probably in the 3 winter months) will be established throughout the province, featuring courses in Farm Motor Mechanics, Farm Management, Production, Marketing, Household Science, Interior Decorating, Landscape Gardening or any other subjects which a sufficient number of students desire.
(c) Night classes will be conducted in the high schools in subjects which the people want, with the assistance of thoroughly trained visiting teachers.
(d) A provincial recreation programme will be set up to fit in with the new physical fitness programme of the federal government.
- PACKING PLANTS AND MACHINERY**
Use to the full the powers of the province to break the packing monopoly and to lower the cost of farm machinery to the farmer.
- CO-OPERATIVES**
Give every encouragement to co-operatives, both producer and consumer, and oppose any increase in the taxation of co-operatives.
- FARM SECURITY**
The CCF government will pass an act to protect the farmer against the loss of his home and his land from causes beyond his control.

By these means a CCF government will boost farm income, bring the price which the farmer receives for his product into line with what he pays for the goods he buys, and establish conditions on the farm which will encourage the ablest and most forward-looking rural young people to remain in agriculture.
