HUGHES CLEAVER

TO THE ELECTORS OF HALTON COUNTY:

As promised, I will deal this week
with the Liberal policy respecting
social security.

We believe that in a country as
wealthy as Canada social security
measures should be in operation
which will assure a fair standard of
living to everyone in all circum-
stances. The fear which arises as a
result of unemployment, illness and
old age, will all be met by adequate
legislation.

Unemployment Insurance: This act
is now in force and has already ac-
cumulated a reserve of over 200 mil-
lion dollars. The act is patterned af-
ter the British act and is purely an
insurance measure. I would hope
that eventually the act would be ex-
tended to include savings feature as
well, so that those who pay unemploy-
ment insurance would be assured of
getting back part of their payments,
even though they are never unemploy-
ed. Under the present act no one
participates excepting the unemploy-
ed.

Family Allowances: No employer of
labour pays any worker a dollar more
because he is a married man with a
family to support. In the past, wealth-
y people have been permitted to de-
duct \$105 yearly from income tax
payments with respect to each child
and the married man in the lower in-
come tax brackets has received no
benefits whatever. Under the Family
Allowances measure which is now in
force, it provides that, commencing
July, 1945, monthly cheques will be
issued to the parents of all children
in Canada of 15 years of age and
under. The amounts vary from \$5 to
\$8 per month, depending on the age
of the child. Every parent will re-
ceive the cheques, but the provision
has been made to prevent duplication
benefits and the amount of the Fam-
ily Allowance cheques is deducted from

the income tax deductions. The Con-
servative Party has criticized this act
and if the Conservative Party is elect-
ed to office, there is grave danger that
the act will be repealed. This measure
is the most forward looking social
security measure that has been passed
during my ten years of office. In
effect, it is a transfer of wealth by
taxation to the tune of 200 million
dollars yearly from the pockets of
those who do not need the money to
the pockets of those who need it very
badly. When the act was passed, I
advocated on the floor of the House
that the Family Allowance payments
should be taken out of the excess pro-
fits of industry, but no steps have
been taken in that regard.
Old Age Pensions: In the last speech
from the throne, the government fore-
casted an amendment to this act, but
time did not permit the introduction
of the amendment. In my opinion, the
means test should be eliminated, the
age limit reduced, especially in respect
to people who are unable to work,

and a new part should be incorporat-
ed in the act in regard to voluntary
savings. The government policy has
not yet been announced in regard to
the new act, but the above indicates
where I stand.
