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Hughes Cleaver Wins Halton Seat For Liberals

King Street Residents Seek Relief From Smoke Nuisance

Sewage System and Queen St. Paving Come in for Discussion
Ostrander Boulevard Approved by Council

The regular monthly meeting of Georgetown Council was held in the Municipal Building on Tuesday, June 5th, with Mayor Harold Cleaver presiding. Reeve E. R. MacDonald and Councillors Bradley, Orr, McGilvray, Lyons and Thompson present.

A deputation of practically all residents on King St. in the Clay Products district, waited on Council in regard to the smoke nuisance caused by smoke from the kilns at Georgetown Clay Products Ltd. The deputation had appeared before the Town Council on several previous occasions, the Town had taken action against the Company about three years ago, and a decision was handed down in court in favour of the Company. The residents of that district are still not satisfied with this decision and are pressing the Council to look into the matter further. They were of the opinion that the Clay Products Co. had taken no steps on their own account to try and lessen the smoke nuisance, which was not only annoying but was lowering the value of their property.

700 ATTEND OPENING LACROSSE GAME AT NORVAL M.R.C.

An estimated crowd of 700 attended the opening lacrosse game at Norval on Tuesday, June 5th, when a strong Brampton team edged the Norvalites by a 7-5 score to win the evening's honours.

It was the official opening of the Norval Memorial Recreation Centre—planned for the youth of the community and dedicated to the young men and women from the district who are serving in the armed forces. Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band were on hand with their usual first-rate music and Rev. J. L. Self was chairman for the brief program which preceded the match. One minute's silence was observed, and the Last Post played by George Burrows, Brampton goalie, who is a member of the RCAF.

The chairman then introduced Jack Worthy, secretary of the O.L.A., Dr. W. F. McLean and Dick Blain, all former Brampton lacrosse stars, who made short speeches, and Nels Robinson, president of the Norval Athletic Association, who pointed out further improvements needed in the park and said he hoped further donations would be added to the already generous gifts from the community.

The official face-off saw Dr. McLean and Dick Blain with Nels Robinson as referee. The game then got underway with Norval off to a fast start, tallying three goals in the first four minutes. Brampton got back two of these before the quarter ended, and at half time were leading 4-3. The game ended 7-5 for the Bramptonians.

At the end of the second period, there was a ball-throwing contest for boys under 16, Russ Fendley and Bill Reid being winners.

The Norval team is entered in a 6-team Peel County League, other teams being Brampton, Caledon, Inglewood, Nortonville and Cheltenham. Through-out June, home games will be played in Norval every Tuesday night.

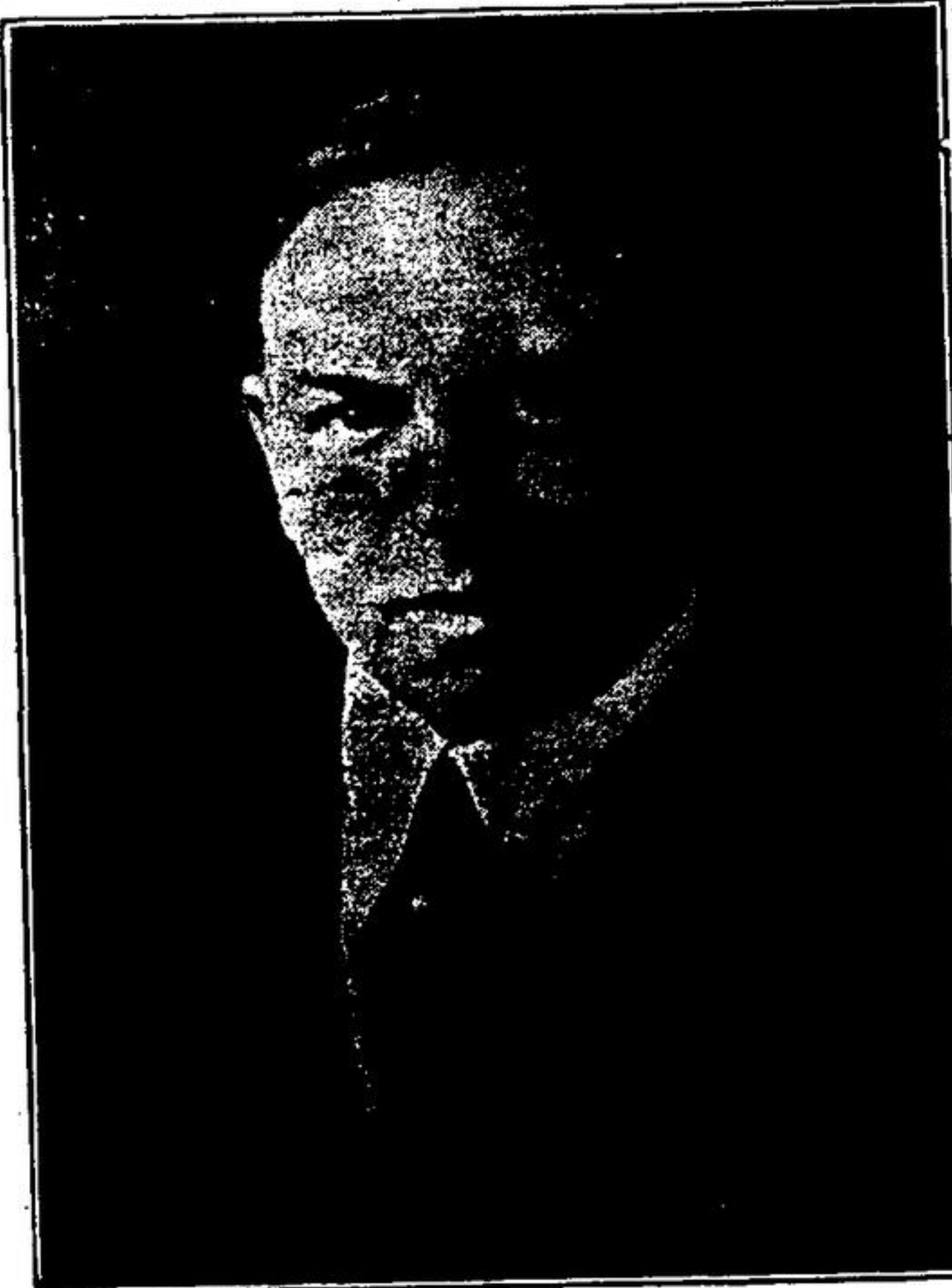

Canada's war-time Prime Minister, William Lyon Mackenzie King, whose Liberal Government was returned to power in Canada on Monday for another term of office.

Halt's Majority 1071 as Halton Provincial Results Tabulated

Final Figures Not Available as Service Vote Still Awaited—Provincial Vote in County Over 3000 Heavier Than in 1943.

Complete tabulation of the Halton County vote in the provincial election, June 4, as received from Wm. G. McDowell of Georgetown, returning officer, show Stanley Hall, Progressive-Conservative member of the last Ontario Legislature outdistancing Mrs. Mary Pettit, Liberal candidate by 1071 votes.

The June 4th vote was much heavier than that of Aug. 4th, 1943, a total of 14,544 votes being cast as compared with 11,390. The increased vote was shared by the two old parties, with the OCF showing a sharp decline in county support. 1943 results were: Hall (PC) 4432; Blakelock (L) 3596; Wilkinson (OCF) 3261; Foster (Ind.) 1111.

Locally, the same trend prevailed. Conservatives and Liberals showing an increased total, with OCF losing.

Complete final figures will not be available until at least a week's time when the service vote is received. Following are the totals for Halton County:

Taken prisoner at Dieppe, after being wounded in both legs, Gnr. Smith was released from German camp Stalag 9C in April. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Smith moved to their home on Main Street, Georgetown from Orillia after he went overseas in August, 1941, with the RCAF. He originally enlisted in 1940 with the Grey and Simcoe Foresters.

As a result of Monday's Federal election, the Liberal Government of Prime Minister King was returned to office. Complete returns will not be known until the service vote is tallied, but indications are that the Liberals will hold about 117 seats, a few short of an over-all majority. The Progressive Conservatives under John Bracken captured about 67 seats to form the official opposition.

In Halton County, Hughes Cleaver, Liberal member for the past ten years was re-elected with a majority of 668 over his closest rival, Allan Nicholson, Conservative candidate.

Mr. Cleaver led in all but three of the county municipalities. Glen Williams voted a Liberal majority for the first time on record, while Oakville, Burlington and Nelson Township were the opposition strongholds.

Georgetown, which gave Stan Hall a majority of 183 over his Liberal opponent in the provincial election a week ago, helped to return Hughes Cleaver as Liberal M.P. in the Federal election, with a 44 vote majority over the Conservative candidate.

The results in Georgetown are on a parallel with the 1940 elections when in a two-man contest, Mr. Cleaver defeated George Atkins, Conservative candidate from Oakville by a margin of 43 votes in Georgetown. 1940 votes were cast in the 1940 election, compared with 1943 on Monday.

OCF support in Georgetown dropped by 96 votes from the recent provincial election with candidate Carlyle C. Browne receiving only 108 votes.

It was a coincidence that both Provincial and Federal candidates for the Progressive-Conservative party received exactly the same number of votes, 643, in both elections in Georgetown, which would indicate that the drop in OCF support and the increased vote both favoured the Federal Liberals. The local vote on Monday was 1943, compared with 1900 the previous week.
