
Considerable discussion centered around the re-surfacing of Queen St. Since the last Council meeting, the sewage engineer had changed his plans in regard to the sewers on Queen St. Should his plans require the sewer to come down the centre of Queen St. if was felt that the road should not be re-surfaced. Some members of Council felt that sewage might be two or three years away yet, and that something should be done at once. It was however, left over until further word could be obtained from the sewage en-

gineer. Waterworks Supt. reported that the new water line in the park, which is being built to supply water at the grandstand and cattle pens, was progressing nicely. The erection of a new rail fence in the park will also be made shortly. Council felt that we have a park to proud of and

As a result of Monday's Federal election, the Liberal Government of Prime Minister King was returned to office. Complete returns will not be known until the service vote is tallied, but indications are that the Liberale will hold about 117 seats, a few shotsive Conservatives under John Bracken captured about 67 seats to form the official opposition.

In Halton County, Hughes Cleaver, Liberal member for the past ten years was re-elected with a majority of 600 ver his closest rival, Allan Nicholson, Conservative candidate.

Mr. Cleaver led in all but three of the county municipalities. Glen Wiliams voted a Liberal majority for the first time on record, while Oakville. Burlington and Nelson Township were the opposition strongholds.
