Housing Situation Under Review by Local Committee

Plans for relieving the housing shortage in Georgetown are in the formative stage, with a recently-appointed committee of citizens studying plans for a satisfactory solution.

A recent report of progress made as reported in a Toronto daily newspaper was somewhat premature. There are many difficulties in the way of securing necessary materials and labour facing the committee. It is known that a scheme under consideration is a local National Housing project, privately financed, under which upwards of 25 houses would be built for sale to returning service personnel or their dependents. The houses may be built in a new subdivision in the southern part of Georgetown and would cost not more than \$5,000 a unit.

Any suggested plan for the building of 40 or 50 houses under Wartime Housing Limited seems to have been shelved in favour of the new scheme. Main objections to Wartime Housing appeared to be the type of house obtainable—one story, no basement, etc.—and many public-spirited citizens thought that in the long run such a subdivision could not be an asset to the town.

An advertisement in last week's Herald, asked servicemen or dependents interested in the new plan to return a form to Lt.-Col. G. B. S. Cousens, Chairman of Georgetown Rehabilitation Council, indicating this. A survey made some time ago showed that over 30 servicemen planned to build homes in Georgetown, and estimates as high as 70 or 80 have since been made by interested individuals. The questionnaire should serve to bring this survey up-to-date and to give a picture of just what Georgetown is faced with in the way of future building requirements.

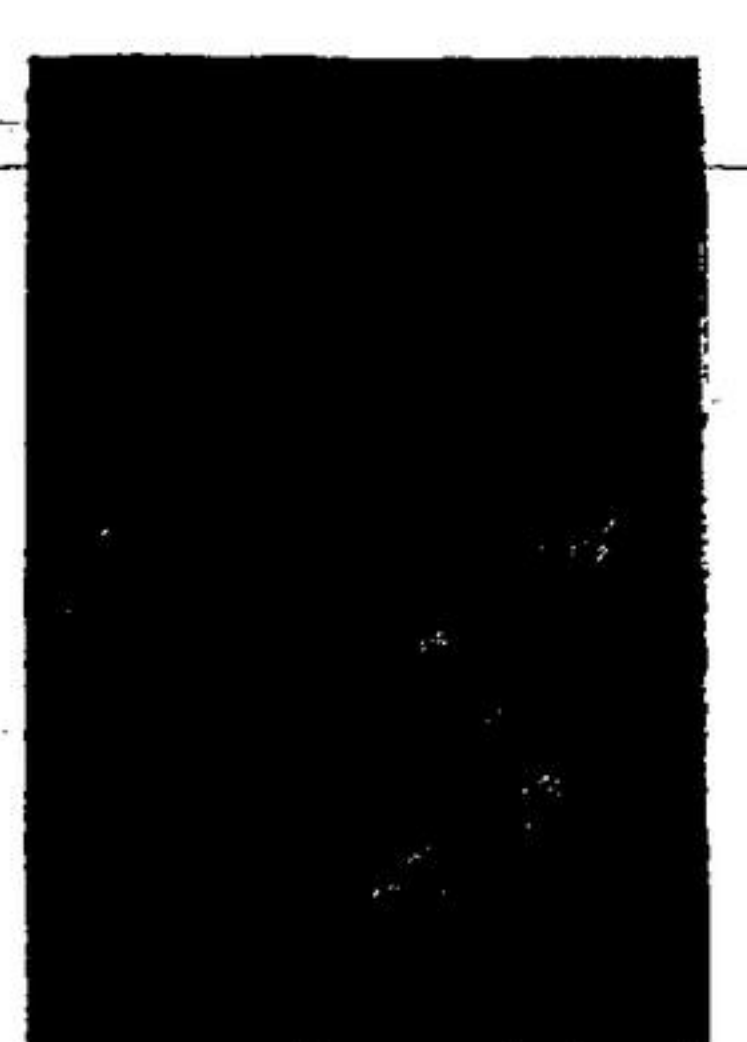
