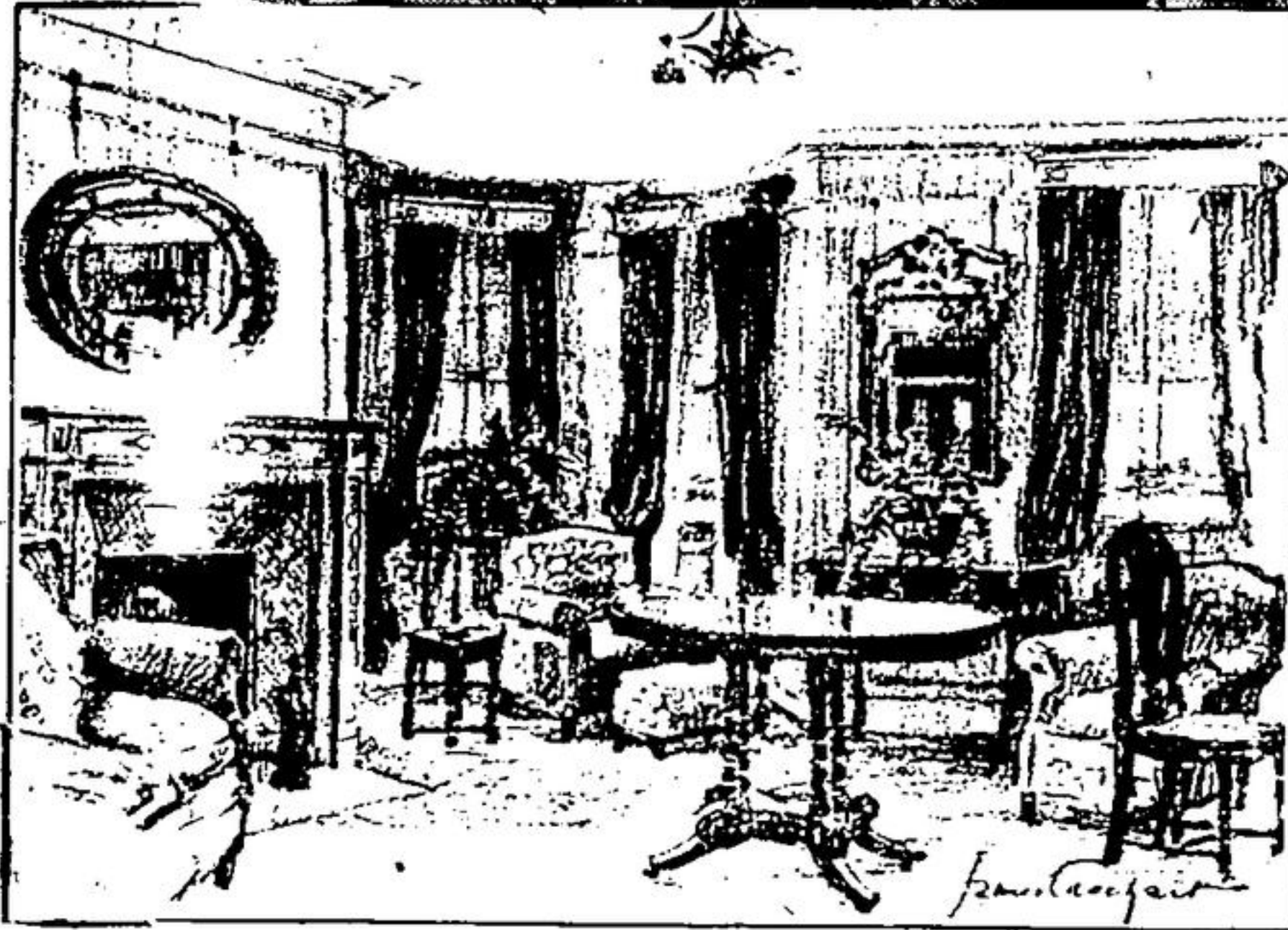


Where Allied Leaders Planned Axis Defeat
