Township School Area No. 1 Formed in Esqueving

Esqueving Township Council held their regular meeting Monday afternoon, June 4th. Members all present with Reeve G. W. Murray presiding. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

A letter from the trustees of School Section No. 14 was read, asking that the council incorporate their school into a township school area.

W. Benton, 261 dog licenses at 30c \$78.30, 1 kennel license \$1.50, supplies 15c, registered letters and stamps \$3.60 stamps \$8.00, total \$91.55.—Carried.

Moved by Cleave, seconded by May, that School Section No. 14 be included in the Township School Area which is being formed.—Carried.

Moved by Brown, seconded by Currie, that the Council of Esqueving make a donation of \$25.00 to Georgetown Rehabilitation Committee. Payable to Emma Mendham, Sec.-Treas.—Carried.

Moved by May, seconded by Cleave, by the Road Superintendent be passed \$2,535.34.—Carried.

Moved by Cleave, seconded by May, that sheep claims be paid: Frank Robertson, 1 sheep killed \$15.00; A. E. Stark, valuator \$2.00.—Carried.

Moved by May, seconded by Cleave, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law setting apart School Sections Numbered 3, 5, 6, 7U, 8, 10, 11 and 14 as a Township School Area, which shall be known as Township School Area No. 1, Esqueving, and that said by-law be now read a first time.—Carried.

Moved by Cleave, seconded by May, that this Council do now adjourn to meet Tuesday, July 3rd, at 8 o'clock p.m., or at the call of the Reeve.—Carried.

present. Having taken the required oath, R. N. Brown moved that G. W. Murray be chairman of this Court of Revision and the motion was seconded by George Currie.—Carried.

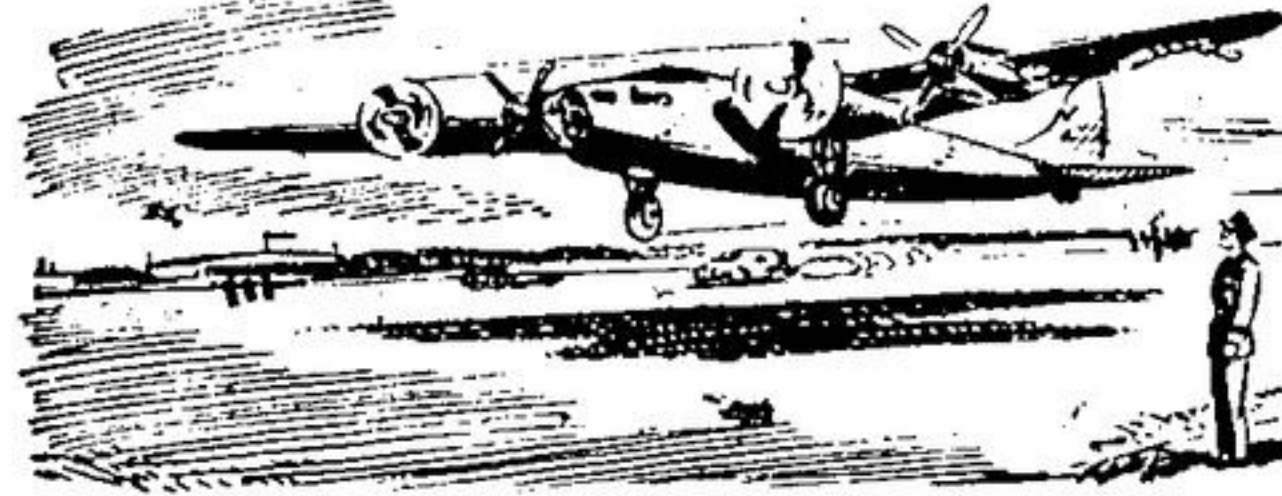
The appeal by John Shannon, on assessment of land was sustained.

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REGULAR MEETING OF REHABILITATION COUNCIL

The regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Rehabilitation Council was held in the Municipal Office. Mrs. Mendham, chairman of ladies committee reported that Mrs. Elberly of Lamhouse had visited one bereaved family and Mrs. J. R. Williams of the Glen had visited two English war brides. Mr. Brill, chairman of publicity, reported that he was still advertising, and he also was receiving quite a number of requests in regard to housing accommodation. Venerable W. G. O. Thompson, chairman of personal services committee, thanked Dr. O. E. Reid, director of public relations, for his favourable comment on Rev. Todd's idea. Mr. Thompson said that he and his committee would try to put it into practice.

The Treasurer reported having received further donations in response to the Council's appeal for funds. The President's comment on this was in the form of a thank you to all donors and how the Council appreciates the

support of the citizens of Georgetown in the work of rehabilitation.

The secretary read a letter from Mr. Walter Carpenter, chairman of Vocational and Education, stating that owing to having accepted a position out of town, he was tendering his resignation, and further stated that he had enjoyed his associations with the group and wished the Council every success in the great work before them. Col. Cousens, president, remarked that we would all miss Mr. Carpenter, as he had faithfully attended the meetings and had been a great help in his advice on various subjects.

Mr. Roy Norton, the vice-president, stated that our local construction companies are in accord with the idea of using part time labour to help to relieve the housing situation. Colonel Cousens closed the meeting with his usual kindly thanks to the workers.

FORMER GEORGETOWN RESIDENT DIES IN HAMILTON

A former resident of Georgetown, Mr. Edward Sanger, passed away at Hamilton General Hospital on June 3rd. The late Mr. Sanger was born in England 80 years ago and after coming to Canada resided for a time at Garafraxa, then at Georgetown, before moving to Hamilton. He was a member of the Church of England. Predeceased several years ago by his wife, he is survived by two sons, William of Mount Hope and Arthur of Toronto, also a brother, John of Brantford. The funeral took place on Tuesday, June 5th, with interment in Woodland Cemetery, Hamilton.

DR. ROBERT T. NOBLE AMONG GRADUATING CLASS AT U. OF T.

A unique feature of the University of Toronto convocation ceremonies on Thursday, June 7th, was a "second graduation" of the medical class of 1895. At the time of their graduation it was the University's custom to confer the degree Bachelor of Medicine and 12 members of the class were present this time to exchange their M.B. for their M.D. Of an original class of 65, 29 are still living and all still in practice in Canada and the United States.

Of local interest is the name of Dr. Robert T. Noble, of Toronto, who was among the 12. Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Noble he was born and raised in Norval. Following graduation he interned in Hamilton General Hospital, practiced in Brantford until 1902, then moved to Toronto where he has since practised. Dr. and Mrs. Noble have three sons, Warwick, a Toronto lawyer, Wing Commander Clark Noble, a doctor with the ROAF overseas and Dr. Robert Noble of Montreal.

Another member of the class of 1895, who was unable to attend the function, is Dr. S. B. Biehn, of Brantford. The funeral took place on Tuesday, June 5th, with interment in Brantford.
