HUGHES CLEAVER'S MESSAGE TO ELECTORS

To my Friends in Halton:
I do want to thank you all. You have worked hard for a good cause and the results which will flow from the victory which you have won will be shared by all.

So far as I am concerned personally I am glad that you saw fit to re-elect me as there are several tasks which I wanted to see through to a finish. Our public health bill is one of them. Then also I did want to have a share in seeing that our returned men are properly re-established. This country too is on the eve of a large home building programme. It has always been a hope of mine that everyone in this country could own his own home. With the National Housing Act the coming years should show substantial results along this line. The problem of the maintenance of consumer buying power at a sufficiently high level to consume our maximum production is another problem in which I am intensely interested and coupled with this, and really part of it is our agricultural problem. We cannot have a truly prosperous country until our farmers are prosperous. For all of these reasons I take up the task again as your member gratefully and with the hope that my next term at Ottawa will see many of these hopes of mine come to pass.
