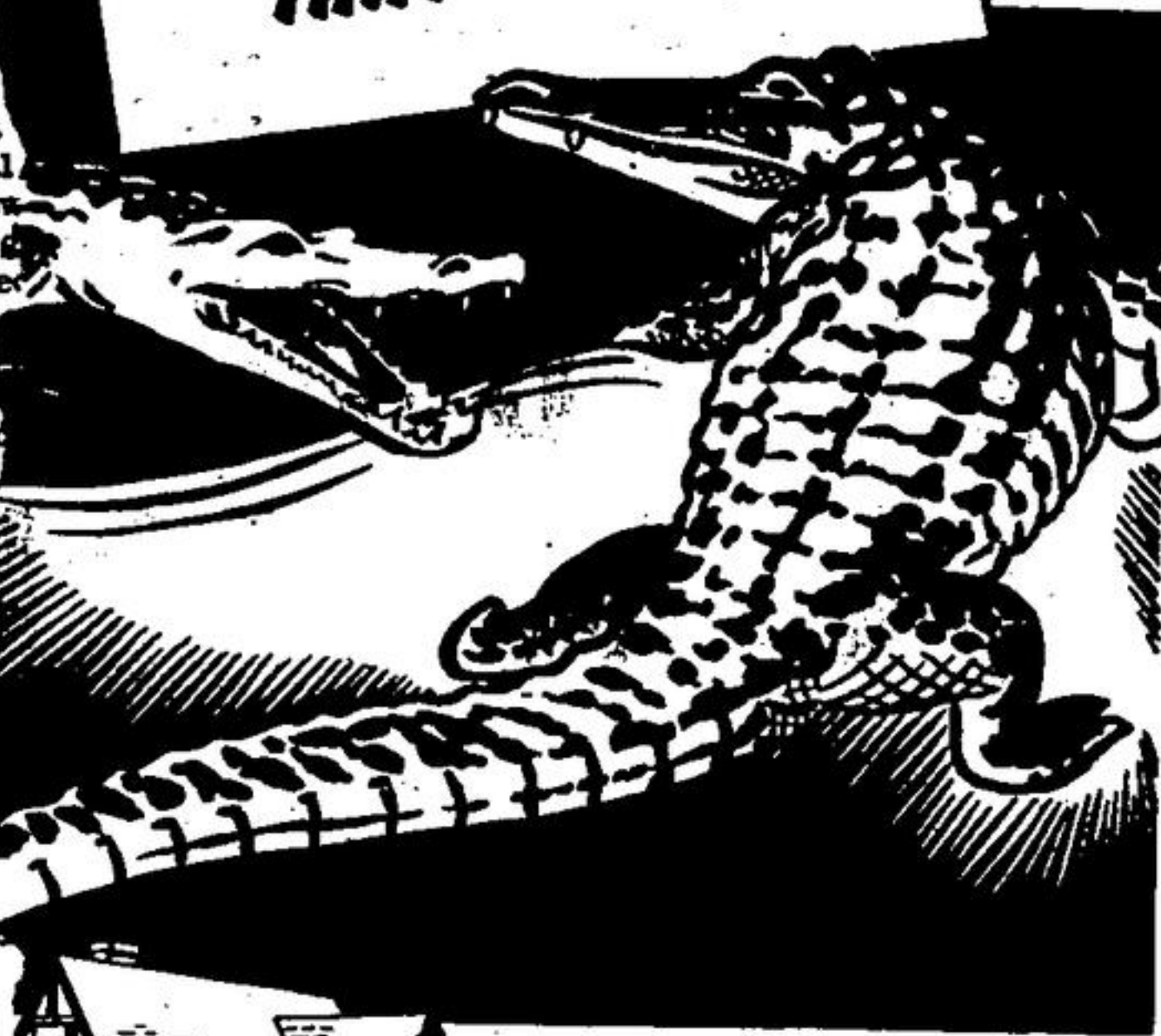

June Session County Council Debate Paving of Road to Stewarttown

The Gaol Governor Moves to Another House—No Decision Yet on Appointment of County Assessor—Other Items Including Halton County Health Service

Halton County Council had one of the liveliest sessions in years at its June Meeting on June 12th. All members were present and the Warden in the chair.

Routine business occupied the morning session. In the afternoon the first person to address council was Mr. Angus Mowat, Inspector of public libraries. He approached the council with a suggestion that a County Co-operative Library be organized which would result in an interchange of books among libraries within the county. No action was taken since council were agreed that they could not see their way clear to adopt such a scheme at the present time although they admitted the idea was a good one.

Representatives were present from the various fair boards in the county appealing for their usual grant which resulted in the following motion: "Moved by Craig and Hillmer, that Milton Fair Board be given a grant of \$250, Acton Fair Board and Esqueving Agricultural Society each a grant of \$175 each."—Carried.

Sheriff W. J. L. Hampshire addressed council with regard to Mr. Calvin Fleming, Governor of the gaol having changed his residence. Mr. Fleming had recently vacated the Governor's residence in favor of his own "property which is adjacent to the Court House. He had notified the Department to that effect with a request that light and heat be provided at his own residence. Since this was entirely up to the county the Sheriff had been notified to that effect. While council was agreed one house was as accessible as the other, it left them with a problem on their hands since if they rented it, they might find themselves in the position of needing the house without having the power of asking the tenants to leave.

It was therefore moved by Cleave, and K. R. MacDonald that the clerk be instructed to secure information from the rental appraiser regarding renting of the Governor's residence.—Carried.

Reeve W. J. Robertson, Chairman of the Good Roads Committee brought up the subject of the Stewarttown road which at their April meeting council had agreed should be paved this year.

Mr. Robertson now contended that paving this road was financially impossible if it were to be included in their present estimates. To undertake this piece of road work would require an additional \$30,000.

Reeve MacDonald, Chairman of the Finance Committee asked why Mr. Robertson had allowed them to prepare their estimates for the year without notifying them that the sum allotted for road expenditure was not enough.

Mr. Robertson replied that the resolution regarding the Stewarttown road was thrown in like a bombshell two months ago when no such expenditure had been allowed for.

Mr. Craig asserted that if the motion went through two months ago then the Road Committee should have made some plans to meet the Finance Committee regarding the expenditure.

Mr. Robertson thought the easiest way out of the difficulty was to postpone paving of the road and made a motion to that effect. There were only three votes in favor of the motion. Finally it was agreed that

means for financing the road work should be further considered. (Since the meeting of Council, we understand on good authority that the work will be undertaken this summer).

Mr. J. M. McDonald reported that final arrangements for instituting the County Health Service had been completed, except that office room for clerical work would have to be arranged. Two nurses had been recommended and approved and were all ready to start work beginning with the fall term.

It was moved by J. M. McDonald and Hillmer, that the application of Beta Sutcliffe for the position of senior nurse with Halton County School Health Service at a salary of \$1,700 per annum with a car allowance of \$600 and with one month's holiday with pay be accepted. Duties to commence August 1, 1945.—Carried.

Moved by Hillmer and McDonald, that the application of Miss A. Gibson for the position of Junior Nurse with Halton County Health Service at a salary of \$1,400 per annum with a car allowance of \$500 and one month's holiday be accepted. Duties to commence August 15, 1945.—Carried.

Both the above applicants and salaries were recommended by the Provincial Department of Health.

Moved by Murray and K. R. MacDonald that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to equalize the assessment for the County of Halton for the year 1946.—Carried.

This brought up the matter of appointing a county assessor, which the members of the council were supposed to have discussed with their respective councils. When the warden asked how many were in favor of a county assessor being appointed two were opposed—that is Esqueving and Georgetown. Oakville had not reached a definite decision but expected to the following Monday.

Mr. Cleave, deputy-reeve of Esqueving stated he understood that the plan had not worked out very satisfactorily in one of the neighbouring counties. For this reason the warden agreed that inquiries should be made as to the cause of the dissatisfaction before final arrangements were made in Halton County.

Incidentally the Treasurer, Miss Margaret Maxted, and the Clerk Mr. W. Deans were appointed to attend the Assessors' Convention which was held on June 13 to 15.

For some time past arrangements have been underway to secure a new site for county road machinery and in this connection it was moved by Robertson and Biggar, that we accept the offer of the town of Milton to purchase lot near C.P.R. station for a nominal fee of \$1 as a county yard for the storage of county machinery.—Carried.

Accounts passed were: Finance, \$868.87; County roads \$18,893.06; Printing, \$65.32; Agriculture, \$52.35; County Buildings \$133.42; Hospital Accounts \$416.00.

No meeting of the council will be held in July. The next meeting is scheduled for August 14 or at the call of the Warden.
