was taken to hospital in England, where he remained until Christmas. He then returned to service on the continent. Jim enlisted originally with the Lorne Scots in April, 1941, and went overseas with them the following June. In October, 1943, he transferred to the 1st Cdn. Paratroop Battalion. Jim is home on a 30-day leave. Two brothers, Sgmn. George Sargent and Plt.-Lieut. Doug Sargent are still overseas.

Pte. George Greensward, a liberated prisoner-of-war looks surprisingly well in spite of starvation rations meted out in Germany. George was taken prisoner at Rimini, Italy, last September. He went overseas in October, 1942, with the Irish Regiment of Canada. Pte. Greensward is a Brampton boy, and is married to the former Evelyn Sanderson, Georgetown. Mrs. Greensward and their two and one-half year old daughter, Carol, reside in town.

Pilot Officer Jim Emmerson, whose letters have been enjoyed by Herald readers from time to time, is home for thirty days, after which he will be posted at the East-Coast. P.O. Emmerson went overseas in April, 1944, and has flown over a great deal of the continent. He enlisted in the RCAF in August, 1943, and trained at Lac-Haine, Victoriaville, Windsor Mills and Hagersville, before proceeding overseas.

Plt. Sgt. George Walker gave his family a pleasant surprise on Saturday when he returned after being overseas since June, 1944. George has enlisted for the Pacific front, and will spend a 30-day leave with his parents before proceeding to Yarmouth, N.S. for further training. Plt.-Sgt. Walker enlisted in the RCAF in December, 1942, and trained at Manning Depot, Central Technical School, No. 1 W.A.G. Guelph and No. 1 B. & G., Jarvis, before going overseas.

Sgt. Bev. Moody, a member of the "Ghost Squadron" has been overseas with the RCAF for two and one half years. Sgt. Moody is a mechanic in the ground crew and has been in the airforce since 1941. Prior to enlisting he was an employee of Apple Products Co., Ltd., Glen Williams. He arrived home in the Glen on Saturday and will spend a 30 day leave there.

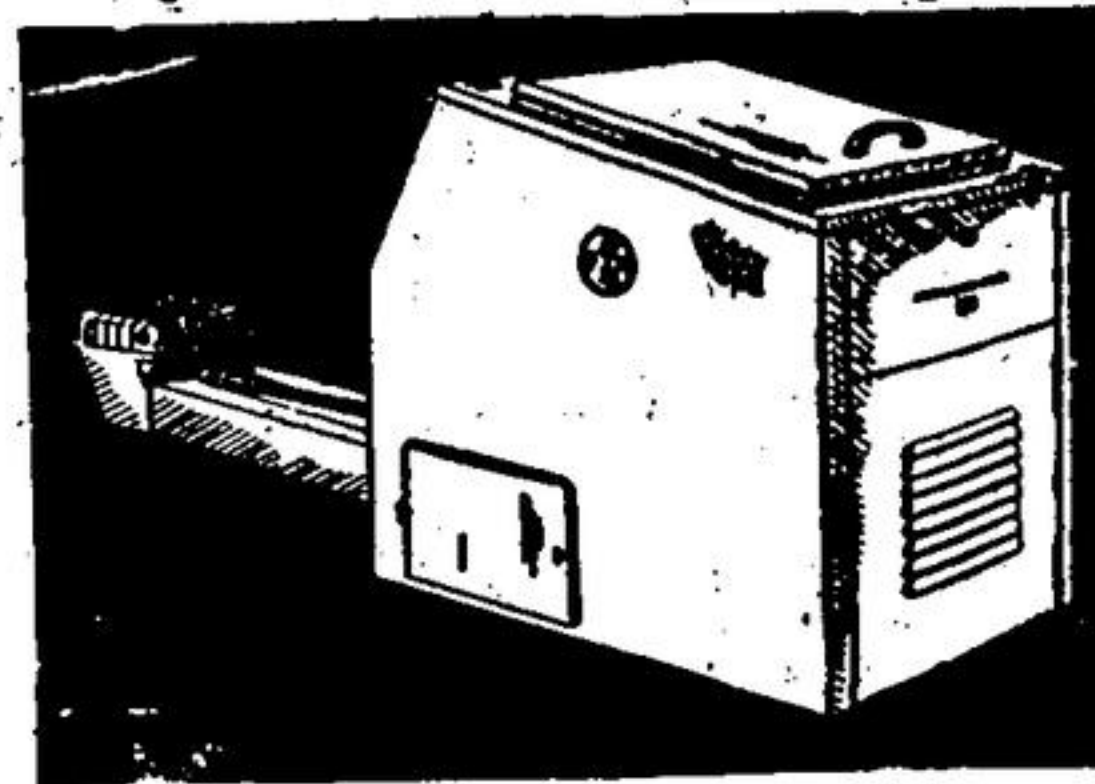
