Ormie (Bud) Carter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben Carter, Toronto, and formerly of Norval, arrived home together on Monday afternoon after spending year in the same Nazi prison camp The boys came over together on the same ship, and it was a real coincidence that Gord and Bud, friends together in Norval, yet serving in altogether different regiments overseas, should find themselves together in the same prison camp, in fact their prison stalls were right next to each other.

Pte. Browne was a prisoner of war for a year. He served with the Seaforth Highlanders and was missing for three months before his mother received word that he was a prisonerof-war. He said they most certainly would have starved had it not been for the Red Cross parcels. Gord enlisted in July, 1942, and prior to that ran his father's malt mill at Norval.

Pte. Ormie Carter has been a prisoner of war since last October and was serving with a special American Force prior to his capture.
