The friends and neighbours of Mrs. Mary Harris, widow of the late Edward James Harris, were shocked to learn of her sudden passing on Friday evening. She was born at Norval Station on April 17, 1884, a daughter of the late John and Mary McClure but at an early age moved with her family to Maple Grove Farm on the outskirts of Georgetown where Mrs. W. H. McClure and family now reside. After her marriage she moved to Chinguacousy and later to Caledon township where she won the high esteem and respect of all those who came to know her.
 In religion Mrs. Harris was of the United Church faith and was a member of Melville United Church. Her pleasant smile, happy disposition, and kindly ways will be keenly missed throughout the circle of her acquaintances. She enjoyed excellent health all her life until recently. While shopping with her family in Brampton she had the misfortune to fall and break her hip just two weeks ago. She was removed to Peel Memorial Hospital where she was enjoying a pleasant visit with her twin daughters Jean and Vera, when she was suddenly called away. She also leaves to mourn her loss two other daughters, Mrs. Jas. Fitzpatrick (Elizabeth) of Brampton; and Marjorie, formerly of the Toronto teaching staff; also two sons, John Stanley of Georgetown; and Herbert at home; and one grandson, Herbie. She is also survived by one brother George of Vancouver, B.C. who although unable to attend personally wired flowers.
 The funeral on Monday afternoon from the family home Lot 2, 4th Line West Caledon, was conducted by Rev. A. O. W. Foreman and was largely attended by relatives and friends from Toronto, Hamilton, Brampton, Georgetown, Caledon and vicinity. The many floral tributes were carried by ten of her nephews. Mrs. Harris was borne to her resting place in Greenwood cemetery, Georgetown by six of her neighbours: George Green, Bert McDonald, Jack McMillan, Roy Switzer, Jack Russell and Tom Foster.

Dear Mrs Wold:
 I have before me a magazine (Catalaine) given by you for men in the services.
 On behalf of my shipmates and myself I say thank you very much, and we greatly appreciate your efforts to bring a ray of sunshine into someone else's heart.

I have been sailing across the Atlantic now for three years. Most of the time my (also my shipmates') only form of relaxation and recreation has been magazines given by the women of Canada (especially from Toronto). I've been to your noble country on many occasions. On each visit I've been warmly welcomed. I was in Canada at Christmas. The whole ship's company received a Christmas parcel donated by the Women's Navy League of Ontario. It made our Christmas very bright as it made us realize that there still is some goodness in the world.

In a few days I shall be going home on leave. I shall take your magazine with me. I know that my folks will get a great deal of enjoyment out of it. When they are through with it they will probably take it to the air-raid shelter so that others can also enjoy it. I thought I should write to show you that your effort to help in this war is bringing much happiness to others far away.
