Rehabilitation Council Asked For Physical Demands Survey

At the regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Rehabilitation Council, held last Wednesday evening in the Municipal Building, the members heard an excellent informal talk by Mr. J. K. Reid, Assistant Casualty Rehabilitation Officer for this district. A veteran of the last war, Mr. Reid has a sympathetic understanding of the problems of handicapped veterans, as he himself lost a leg due to war injuries. He explained the use of a new form designed to find what jobs handicapped veterans might fill and asked the local group for consideration in asking local factories to fill out the information on the form, with a view to placing casualties of this war in proper positions in industry. Lt.-Col. G. B. S. Cousens, chairman of the Council, reported on the regional conference which he had attended recently in London, and hinted that new measures for helping veterans to build homes are under contemplation by the government and will soon be announced. He also informed the meeting that the Rehabilitation Council was now registered under the War Charities Act and could accept public and private donations. The secretary and treasurer's reports were presented by Mrs. Mendham and donations since the last meeting were acknowledged from: Lions Club \$10; Esqueping Township \$25; Limehouse W.I. \$5; Local Council of Women \$10; I.O.G.E. \$10. Mayor Harold Cleave reported for the Reception Committee and explained that the previous custom of personal calls by the committee on returning overseas personnel had had to be abandoned now that men were coming home in such large numbers. In place of this, cards were now sent to the men inviting them to meet the Committee at a certain time and place. The first such meeting had been held on June 27 in the Municipal Building, when seven local men had been entertained by the Committee, and Mayor Cleave said the new system was working fine.
