### ROYAL SHORTHORN CLUB WILL SPONSOR SHOW

The Royal Shorthorn Club, whose membership includes breeders of Shorthorns in the counties of Wellington, Halton and Dufferin, have assumed the sponsorship of the Regional Shorthorn Show to be staged at Erin on Thanksgiving Day.

A prize list offering of approximately \$700 has been made possible through special grants offered by the Erin Fair Board, the Ontario Live Stock Branch, the Ontario Shorthorn Club, the Wellington County Council and several contributions by local Shorthorn breeders in the area. The 1944 show staged at Erin was the largest showing of Shorthorns in Canada that year. With an increased prize list offering made possible by additional grants from the above contributors, it is expected that the 1945 event will be one of the major Shorthorn attractions in Ontario this year.

One of the year's features will be a special class for boys and girls eighteen years of age and under on the day of the show. Contestants in this class are eligible to show a steer or heifer, pure bred or grade, that is sired by a registered Shorthorn bull. For these junior showmen there will also be a showmanship class, in which there will be offered prizes for the five best showmen. Prof. R. O. Knox of the O.A.C. will be the official judge in the junior competitions. Junior farmer club work is assuming an ever increasing importance in Ontario, and the Royal Shorthorn Club have seen fit to offer substantial prizes to this section of their Shorthorn show prize list.

### HIGHEST DISPERSAL SALE AVERAGE SINCE 1943 STAGED AT OAKVILLE

Bred Heifer Sells for \$3,600 and Heifer for \$25,415

The highest dispersal sale average for a Canadian Holstein herd since 1942 was obtained on June 30 at Oakville when the Oakhall herd of W. E. Hall bought \$25,415. The 40 head sold averaged \$635.

The best price of the day was \$3,600 paid by J. J. E. McCague, Alliston, for Trallynd Flinderne Pietje, a bred heifer. She is a daughter of Montic Renown, who sold for the Canadian Record price of \$14,100 in 1942, and is in calf to "Sovereign" the All-Canadian two-year-old bull for 1944. McCague also bought a pair of six-months-old Kwin "Sovereign" daughters at \$1,200 each.

Runner-up for the top animal was Wallace D. Wright, Brockville, who secured a five-months-old "Sovereign" heifer calf at \$1,225, the second highest price of the day for a female, and a five-year-old cow at \$850. Strathaven Supreme Comrade who was Reserve All-Canadian three-year-old bull for 1944 sold for \$2,000 to Orson D. Smith, Canastota, N. Y. The other herd sire, Elm Colanthus

Rag Apple Righto, went to Blacet Bros, Goderich, at the bargain price of \$600.

Sheffield Farms, St. George, bought two head, paying \$710 for a three-year-old and \$625 for a bred heifer. W. N. Gilbert, Bronte, paid \$900 for a mature cow; Harold W. Honey, Beesgrave \$625 for a four-year-old; and W. St. Clair Low, Terra Cotta, \$600 and \$475 for a pair of mature cows.

Five bred heifers averaged \$1,108 each; eleven heifer calves \$580; six open heifers \$393; and 16 milking females \$533.

E. J. Meagher, Oakville, paid \$625 for a two-year-old heifer; Dr. Chas. N. Blanshard, Freeman, \$460 for a mature cow; and Max Greenberg, Freeman, \$435 for a seven-year-old. The auctioneers were L. E. Franklin, Toronto, and Ted Jackson, Port Perry.
