COMMUNITY SING-SONG TO START AT HUTTONVILLE

This Sunday, July 15th, will see the resumption of the Community Sing-Songs at Huttonville Park that proved so popular last year, it was announced last week by Gordon Vivian.

It was revealed that a sum of \$890.50 was taken in silver collections last year, which proceeds were distributed to various charitable organizations. The sponsors of this program point with pride to the record of more than a quarter of a million cigarettes being sent overseas to boys from Peel County, Georgetown and Glen Williams. "Thank You" letters were received from 500 recipients of overseas gifts.

"The programme will be even better than last year," said Gordon Vivian, "C. A. Chinn, our sound operator is going to provide talks this year and we will also offer amateur talent, quiz contests and the usual community singing."

"Proceeds of these Sunday night Community Singing concerts will again be distributed to deserving charitable organizations," said Mr. Vivian.

During the year a voluntary collection of \$39 was made and given to the Navy League.

Another Public School activity which receives little publicity, but which has done its share, both towards the war effort and in encouraging thrift among the children, is the purchase of war savings stamps. Last year's purchase of \$1817.50 set a new record in this direction. Since January 1st, 1941, school pupils have purchased almost \$7,000 worth of war savings stamps.
