

COUNTY COUNCIL

Prizes Presented at Meeting of County Council Tuesday—Arrangements made for Establishment of Health Unit—C.P.R. is asked to Consider Safety at Guelph Junction Crossing—New Addition to House of Refuge to be Opened September 8th

Halton County Council, after an absence of two months, met in session at Milton last Tuesday, the Warden presiding and all members present, with the exception of Reeve Smith.

Following the reading and adoption of the minutes announcement was made of the prize-winning essays competing in the competition open to the program, consisting of a solo the guests of the County Council at their June meeting.

Only four of the prize winning contestants were present, Marion Cunningham, the first prize winner and three others. The Warden presented the cheques, congratulating each girl in turn upon her success.

It was moved by Robertson and Gilbert that Council petition the Selection and Release Committee for the release of Sgt. S. J. Wilson from the Armed Forces, his services being urgently needed on the County Roads.

Reports and business arising from the Standing Committee, discussed in Committee of the Whole with Reeve Hillier in the chair, were as follows:

Hospital—Accounts passed, \$944.10. County Buildings—This committee recommended payment of accounts amounting to \$304.76. It was also recommended that a fan for the Registry Office be purchased price set at \$75. A letter from the Boiler Inspector recommended renewal of piping leading to water gauge. All other parts were considered as being in good condition.

Session took place in regard to the County residence and it was moved by Craig and Whitaker "that Mr. Deans write to the County Gaoler asking him to state in writing that he does not wish to live in the governor's residence during his term of office."

Printing—Accounts were passed amounting to \$100.85. Agriculture and Reforestation—Accounts were passed for Chas. Readhead for corn borer inspection, \$125.45. Lewis Patterson, corn borer inspection, \$123.20.

It also recommend that a letter be sent to the C.P.R. asking that if a new station be built at Guelph Junction, that the crossing east of the present station be considered.

Special Communications—An invitation was received and accepted from the House of Refuge, Brampton, to the County Council Officials, their wives and interested friends to attend the opening of the new addition to the House of Refuge on Saturday, September 8th at 7.30 p.m.

Other resolutions passed were as follows: Moved by J. M. McDonald and Craig "that motion moved by J. M. McDonald and seconded by Mr. Craig on June 12th, 1945, as follows: "that a supplementary by-law be enacted to cover \$21,000.00, underestimated on Road Expenditure and that \$9,000 be allowed to be expended on the Georgetown link be rescinded."

Moved by Near and Murray that the Clerk arrange with the Railroad Board to meet County Railway Board of this County in regard to improving safety at Guelph Junction in case of the building of a new station.

Moved by J. M. McDonald, that the office on the N.W. corner of the County Building be allotted to the County School Nurse Service for their central office.

The senior nurse was introduced to members of the Council at the conclusion of County Council meeting.

Moved by Robertson and Mrs. Pettit that the Health Committee recommend that they be given power to make the necessary expenditure to set up and carry through the Health program.

A by-law was prepared, read and passed, to provide for additional expenditure (\$30,000) on the system of County Roads as approved by the order in council during the year 1945.

This by-law to replace that rescinded in by-law previously referred to as passed on June 12th, 1945. Council adjourned to meet September 11th, 1945.


