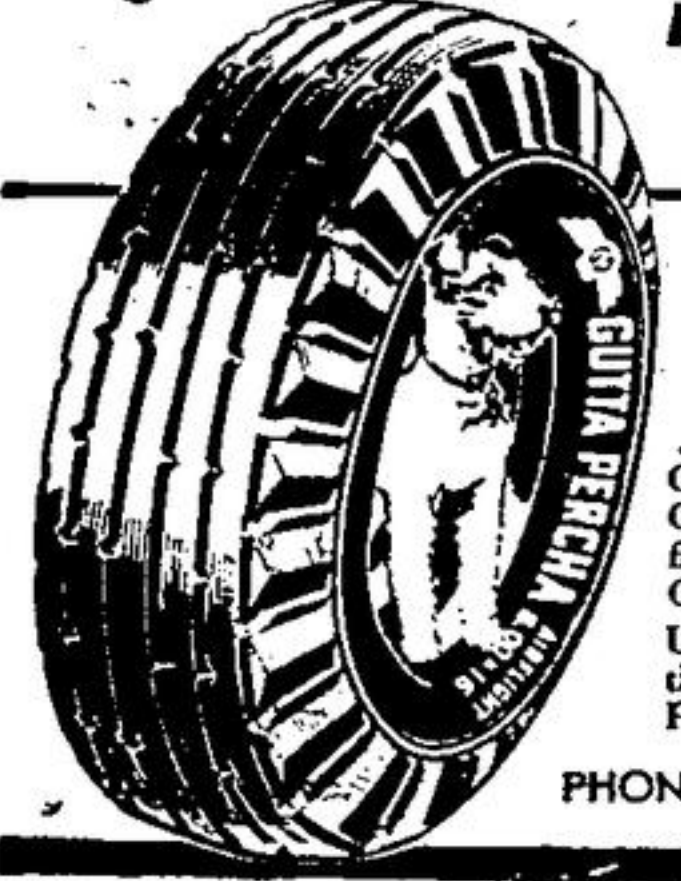

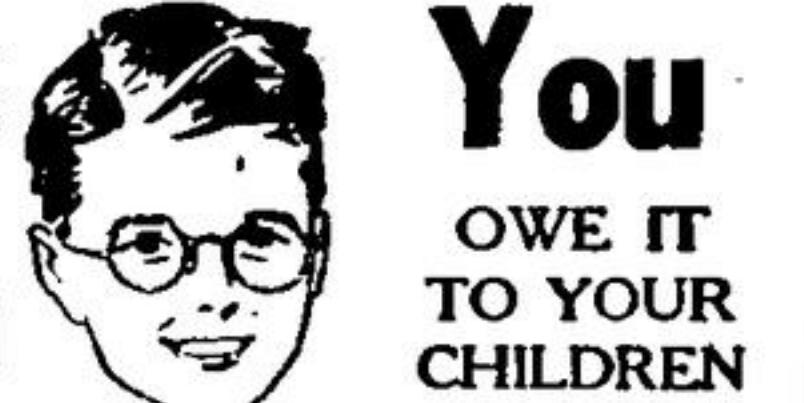
**LIMEHOUSE W. I. GUESTS OF LOCAL GROUP**

After the usual opening ceremony, the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted and correspondence dealt with. Plans for the exhibit at the Fair were completed, also delegates appointed to attend the officers' rally to be held at Aston on Oct. 4th. The program convenors for the day were Mrs. Fred Armstrong, Mrs. Wm. Millere and Mrs. A. Semple and they invited the Limehouse Institute to visit at this meeting and provide the program. At this point Mrs. Ellerby the President of the Limehouse Institute took the chair and after a word of thanks to the Georgetown ladies for their kind invitation, conducted a very interesting program. Several of the Limehouse ladies took part in the program, each one giving some interesting remarks of present day conditions and events. There was a very pleasing solo by Mrs. Norton. **RED CROSS SHIPMENTS**

That the local Red Cross was not idle during the closing months of the war is seen in the number of articles shipped to headquarters in the last three shipments on March 12, May 16 and July 10. These included: Seamen's Comforts—11 turtle-neck sweaters, 6 scarves, 7 pr. service socks, 21 prs. navy socks, 18 ribbed helmets, 1 seaman's socks. Army Comforts—7 high neck L.S. sweaters, 20 pr. khaki gloves, 12 46' scarves, 30 prs. socks. Air Force—2 V-neck sleeveless sweaters, 2 pr. socks. Hospital supplies—33 pr. men's flannel pyjamas, 211 small operating sheets, 3 large bed pads, 40 soldiers' comforts bags, 61 personal property bags. Civilian Clothing—25 large quilts, 11 crib covers, 7 girls' blouses, size 10; 2 boys knitted suits, 1 girls' toque and mitts, 28 infant's nightgowns, 1 yr.; 40 girls combinations, size 2; 19 girls bloomers, size 10; 20 girls undervests, size 6; 30 boys underpants, size 6; 40 boys undervests, size 6.

2,347,000 blood donations were made in Canada, 1,423,000 in Ontario, through the volunteer Blood Donor Service of the Canadian Red Cross Society since the first clinics were established in January, 1940. The lives of hundreds in the army, the navy and the air force were saved through this service.
