### Mr. Seymour Penson Dies in 95th Year

Death came peacefully to one of Georgetown's oldest residents, Mr. Seymour R. G. Penson, last Wednesday, September 12th, after an illness of two days in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton. In full possession of his mental and physical faculties until the end, the late Mr. Penson was 94 years of age.

Born in London, England, he came with his parents to Canada seventy-six years ago. The family were pioneer Muskoka residents and still own part of the original homestead at Ferndale for a summer home. Mr. Penson achieved fame as a scenic artist and worked for the old Grand Theatre in Toronto as well as providing scenery for the Canadian National Exhibition. He was associated for many years with the T. W. Hand Fireworks Co. at Cooksville and from 1900 until his retirement, was business manager of the firm.

Predeceased five years ago by his wife, the former Flora Macdonald Couits, Mr. Penson is survived by two daughters, Arline and Elizabeth at home and a son, George, of Toronto. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Charles Penson, Spokane, Washington, and two brothers, Ernest of Creston, B.C., and Harold, Port Carling; two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held from St. George's Church of England on Saturday, with Ven. W. G. O. Thompson in charge of the service. Pallbearers were Mr. William Hand and former associates in the company with which he had been connected for so many years. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

### MEN FROM THE ARMED FORCES FOR FARMING

Any personnel in the Armed Services, wishing to be released for farm work at any period of the year, should now be advised to—

- (a) Apply to their Commanding Officer for release for farm work, stating past farm experience, giving reasons for request.
- (b) Give location, type and size of farm, wherever possible.
- (c) If possible, submit a letter from a parent or former farm employer and a letter from municipal or other official in home locality, indicating need for services.

Agricultural Labour Survey Committees have been set up by the Federal Department of Labour, to co-operate with the Armed Services in the release of men for farm work. These Committees represent the Provincial Department of Agriculture, the Armed Services and the National Employment Service. They are prepared to advise farmers or Service personnel on any problems concerning such releases. For further information write your Agricultural Labour Survey Committee, care of Mobilization Registrar, at Charlottetown, Halifax, St. John, Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, London, Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Regina, Edmonton, or Vancouver.
