Georgetown's First Poultry Show Proves to be Huge Success

The first show of the Georgetown and Hamilton County Poultry Assoc. was staged in conjunction with the Annual Georgetown Fair on Sat. Sept. 8th. The Weather Man smiled almost too much as the thermometer hovered close to the nineties. It was too hot to be comfortable and the birds suffered in the extreme heat, some casualties resulting.

Judges for this show were Roy Crosby on all large fowl and Specials, and C. E. HERRINGTON on Bantams and Pigeons. J. S. Greenshields was booked to judge pigeons but had to cancel arrangements at the last minute, owing to ill health. We missed his entry on Bantams too. Sorry Crosby, better luck next time.

Exhibits were on hand from Milton, Dundas, Hamilton, Guelph, Erin, Brampton, Acton, Toronto, Willowdale, Welland, Windsor, Chatham, Scarborough, Ashgrove and Georgetown.

Knight, Streetsville; and Mr. and Mrs. George Smith, Welland, who liked our town so much they stayed over till Sunday afternoon.

Now as regards the classes, this was one of the best balanced shows of the year with large fowl predominating in numbers with plenty of competition in all classes. The champions are as follows:

Best bird in show to Spence on a Buff Laced Poland hen. Champion male to Sunset Farm on a Buff Orpington cock. Champion cockerel to Sunset Farm on a S. C. Black Minorca. Champion pullet to McLaren on a Buff Orpington. Champion four birds to Sunset Farm on Buff Orpingtons, Champion Ornamental Bant to Bill Hayes on a Silver Bright cock. Champion Game Bant to Bill Gower on a Modern Pyle cock. Champion pigeon to Weaver on a Modena cock. Champion female pigeon to Yeck on a Jacobin hen. Yeck also winning Best Display Pigeons.

An analysis of the classes I judged is as follows:

Black Cochins Bantams had 2 cocks. All the fellows laid off figuring the competition might be too hot. Buff Cochins were conspicuous by their absence. White Cochins had 4 fair birds on hand with the cock the best of the lot. Rose Combs had a nice class with all the winners above average. Pleased to say this variety is coming back strong this year. Polish Bantams had competition right down the line with 1st cock, hen and old looking best. Sebrights were hot with 5 exhibitors competing. Golden and silver showed together. 1st cock on a Silver that was in new feather. Had beautiful lacing, proper size, fair head and good type. This is a hard bird to beat. He went on to win Champion Bant. 2nd cock, also a silver with not the perfect edging of the winner. 1st hen, a Golden that was in new feather and had nice even lacing. She had better type than the 2nd hen which was a silver. 1st chl and pullet were real nice, well-matured and will take plenty of competition. Barred Rocks had 11 birds on display with 3 exhibitors competing. 1st cock had nice condition, good type, proper size and fair color. 1st hen wins easily having good type, proper size, good straight bar, with the width of dark and light bars conforming very closely to Standard. 2nd hen also a good one, not quite the coloring of winner. 1st chl, a little beauty. Nice clean top and an easy winner. 2nd chl, very similar to 1st, not so clean on top. 1st pullet wins easily. Has a very straight bar and the proper shade. 2nd pullet also nice, not as good surface as winner. A chl and pullet shown in this class and unplaced caused some comment. They had more narrow barring than found so far in Barred Rock Bantams, but looked to me to be too large in frame for their maturity. I do believe this breeder is going to get somewhere with this stock in a year or two and I give him credit for his ingenuity. Modern Games had a good pair of Black Reds and a good pair of Pyles, especially 1st cock which went on to win Champion Game Bant in show. Old English Black Reds had plenty of competition. 1st cock wins over 2nd on color alone. Both had good type and feathering, but 2nd showed signs of wheaton. Hens weren't ready. In the young birds, 1st pullet looked best. A.O.C. had a real line up of Spangles. Especially liked 1st cock and 1st pullet.

A.O.V. Ornamental had a good Black Tailed Jap cock 1st and a Mille Fleur cock 2nd. 1st hen went to the Mille Fleur and 2nd to a R.I. Red 1st chl. to the Black Tailed Jap and 2nd to a White Leghorn, 1st pullet to the Mille Fleur which also won best or-

amental female. Pigeons had a nice line up with 3 hot fanciers fighting it out. Birmingham Rollers were shown all classes together. Gave 1st to a pair of Whites in full plumage; 2nd to a pair of Badges. A real pair of Black Fans look 1st; 2nd to a pair of Saddles. Pigmy Pouters had a good pair of Blacks up for 1st. A.O.V. Fancy had quite a variety. Finally sorted down to a good pair of Modenas for 1st and a good pair of Black Jacobins for 2nd. The Modena cock winning champion pigeon and the Jacobin hen winning champion hen.

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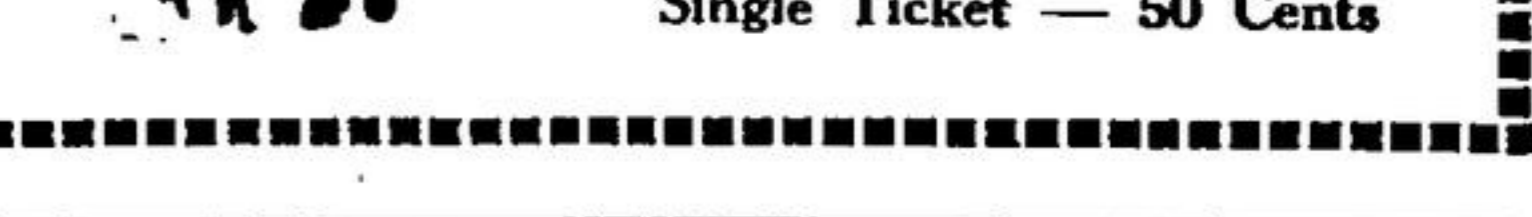
