HALTON FLOWING MATCH SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 29

The annual match of the Halton Plowmen's Association is scheduled for Monday, October 29, on CLUNY OASTLE FARM, home of Ward Ruddle & Sons, on the fifth line of Esqueving Township.

We understand from President W. J. Robertson of Lowville that the 1945 prize list has been revised to be in keeping with modern trends towards increased farm mechanization. In addition to three walking plow classes there will be five tractor classes. One of the latter is open only to Halton contestants under 18 years; a second to Halton plow boys and girls under 21 years, and others, irrespective of age who have never previously competed at a plowing match. The prize list also includes a three furrow tractor class open only to contestants from Halton, Peel, Wentworth and Wellington Counties.

A display of farm machinery and labour saving devices under the chairmanship of Stanley L. Hall, M.P.P., is being arranged. This feature attracted keen interest at the 1944 match, and we understand is being developed to include some demonstrations.

The ladies of the Ashgrove W. I. are looking after the noon-day lunches and the Hornby W.I. is catering for the evening banquet which is to be held in the Hornby Orange Hall. Dr. W. R. Graham, of Burlington, is to be the guest speaker, with Ronald Stewart, tenor soloist of Clarkson and Joe Nova, local accordionist, as guest artists.
