HALTON PLOWING MATCH SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER *

The annual match of the Halton Plowmen's Association is scheduled for Monday, October 29, on CLUNY OASTLE FARM, home of Ward Ruddell & Sons, on the fifth line of Esquesing Township.

We understand from President W. J Robertson of Lowville that the 1945 prize list has been revised to be in keeping with modern trends towards increased farm mechanization. In addition to three walking plow classes there will be five tractor classes. One of the latter is open only to Halton contestants under 18 years; a second to Halton plow boys and girls under 21 years, and others, irrespective of age who have never previously competed at a plowing match.
