PUBLIC MEETING TO BE HELD



A PUBLIC MEETING Will be held at **Princess Theatre Milton** **Thurs., Nov. 15, 8 p.m.**



At this meeting the scheme will be explained fully and questions answered. Ballots will be supplied at the meeting to producers who have registered, so that they may vote then. Registrations will be accepted at the meeting and also for ten days after it. All producers who are registered will receive ballots, either at the Agricultural Representative's office, at the meeting or by mail. Copies of the proposed scheme may be secured at the Agricultural Representative's office or at the public meeting. All ballots must be returned to the Agricultural Representative before December 8, 1945. Any Ballots received after that date will not be recorded.

Baptist Church Anniversary Service

Sunday, October 28th, marked the 90th Anniversary of the organization of the local Baptist Church. A very fine speaker was obtained for this occasion in the person of Rev. Lyle Bristol, B.A., B.D., S.T.M. of McMaster University.

At the morning service Rev. Bristol spoke from Matt. 28: 18-20—the Great Commission, stressing the fact that it was a milestone in the history of the church. The command of Jesus was impressed on his listeners who were reminded that the message of the Gospel was what the world needs, and that we must have absolute confidence in our Leader. The choir rendered a very fine setting of "Jesus Lover of my Soul," the bass solo of which was beautifully sung by Douglas Cole. As a preparation for the message brought by Rev. Bristol, the pastor of the church, Rev. Ostrom, sang a lovely setting for "Break Thou the Bread of Life."

In the evening Rev. Bristol was again the messenger, and spoke on the question of Paul "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" Three steps were set before the congregation—(1) Face the demands of Christ first of all, to come to Him as we are; (2) To bring what we have and use it in His service; (3) To be faithful unto the end, no matter what the cost.

The evening anthem sung by the choir was that very beautiful old selection "Son of My Soul," the solo parts being taken by Rev. Ostrom and Mrs. Ostrom. Following the sermon, Mrs. Ostrom sang by request the old favourite "The Holy City."

The artistic arrangement of bronze mums added much to the beauty of the services. Each evening last week Rev. Bristol spoke in the Baptist Church, bringing heart-searching messages from the Word of God. There was special music at each service.
