Georgetown Leads Halton County in 9th Loan

VICTORY LOAN SOARS TO 234 PER CENT OF OBJECTIVE

Esquesing Will Purchase \$12,650 In Road & Snow Plow Equipment

Among the important items on the agends at the November meeting of Esquesing Township Council was the purchase of anowplowing equipment. At a previous meeting on Oct. 26th, tenders were opened and representatives from three firms, together with J. D. Ludgate, municipal engineer were present. It was finally decided that Council members would go and see the equipment in order to get a better idea of the different types of mechinery.

On motion of Ourrie and Brown. a motion was passed calling for purchase of \$12,650 in machinery, consisting of caterpillar tractor, \$6875; snow plow, \$3465 and dozer, \$2310. A preious motion by May and Cleave called for purchasing an International D14 crawler tractor, \$6040; snowploy, \$2800 and dozer \$2200, including tractor cab, \$434, failed to carry to them. when voted upon

An open season for deer will be held in Esquesing Nov. 21st to 24th in-The Township will be supplied with 100 licences, 80% to residents and 40% to non-residents, and these may be secured from the clerk.

A petition having been received asking for street lighting in the hamlet of Stewarttown, the clerk was instructed to prepare the necessary bylew. He was also instructed to prepare a by-law recommending a speed limit of 30 miles an hour on No. 7 highway through Norval, and on the 7th Line through Stewarttown

By-law No. 11 empowering the collector of rates to collect penalties for non-payment of taxes after Dec. \$1st, 1945, was passed, and the Reeve and Treasurer were empowered to sell and assign \$6500 D. of C. Bonds registered in the name of the Township, Sailway Bonus Fund.

HALTON CLUB TEAMS COMPETE IN PROVINCIAL COMPETITIONS

inter-club competitions for Ontario's Junior Farmer Club teams were held at the Ontario Agricultural College on Otcober 26th. Competitions were held in dairy cattle; beef swine; horses; poultry, grain and potatoes; and each of the 240 clubs in the Province was eligible to enter a team of two club members between the ages of 16 and 20 years

inclusive.

Halton entered teams from the folclubs: Milton Dairy Calf Olub, Halton Boys' Swine Club, Halton Ajax Oat Club, and Halton Galore Barley Club. While no high honours were secured, the four teams made an excellent showing in competition with Ontaro's top club members. This was all the more noteworthy in view of the limited amount of training the respective teams were able to secure during the busy fall season from their coach, Agricultural Rep-

resentative J. E. Whitelock In the Grain Club project, Halton placed 9th and 13th, with 24 teams competing in the province. The Ajax Out Club was represented by Hornby, and Hank De-Georgetown, while Douglas Alexander and Don Ismond of Georgetown, represented the Galore Barley Olub. In the Dairy Oattle project with 39 teams competing, Halton placed fifteenth, being represented by Wm; Brain, Norval; and Praser Mo-Mabb, of Georgetown. The Swine Olab project brought together 12 teams, with the Halton team of Gordon Alton of Freeman and Charton Disk of Georgetown placing 18th,

The total amounts to something more than a \$200 bond for every man, woman and child in the district. It will be recalled that in the 7th Loan, Georgetown led the whole Dominion in per capita sales of \$150 a person and it is expected that this time the same record will be set.

The Loan Committee, salesmen and the people who subscribed their savings all merit a word of praise for the grand support of the 9th Victory Loan. It has been a relatively easy job to sell bonds, because we in this district do not have to be reminded of the need for the Loan with its theme "Sign Your Name to Victory." It is but one phase of a war effort which saw Georgetown men flock to the colours, local manufacturers pour out war equipment, farmers increase the production of livestock and produce, and citizens generally help in every way possible to bring victory. Now in peace-time, results of the Loan conclusively prove that Georgetown is just as interested in winning the peace and in restoring a balanced economy to Canada.
