Dear Sir:
I have read with interest a letter in your paper last week by a John Street resident re the conduct of the dancers and general conditions in connection with the Rose Room Saturday night dances.

Now the writer has no personal knowledge of the things mentioned as he has never been at the Arena during a dance. We note the clause "brawling and drunkenness rampant" and think that this is entirely uncalled for. There are a lot of very fine young people who go to these dances, and we are quite sure that if things were in the condition as stated they would not continue to attend. We also believe that if any misconduct was reported to our police department that they would very promptly take care of the matter. In this connection we may say that there have been several convictions for parking on lawns and driveways; this should be brought to the attention of the police as you will surely agree with me that it is impossible for them to know whether a car is illegally parked or not. It may be your own car or the car of a friend parked on your driveway.

As to noise in the dance room or out of it; this is hard to control, but we are advised that the dance band have a very efficient man to take care of any misconduct in the building and that he does so. However, the whole matter is being taken up with the police and also with the management of the dance band towards the end that conditions may be made as nice as possible for the residents in that district.

We believe that we have one of the finest dance rooms in this part of the country, and also that the dances are conducted as orderly as in any other dance room where the general public is admitted.

Every effort is being made by the members of the Arena Board to clean up the Arena and make it suitable for good clean sport, particularly for our young people.
