Jimmy Emerson Writes to Smith & Stone Employees

October 2, 1945.

No. 1 Y Depot, Moncton, N.B.

Dear Friends:
Just a short note to thank you for all the cigarettes and parcels you sent me while I was in England. They were certainly greatly appreciated.

The end of "Pacific War" left us high and dry here in the Maritimes, and since then things have been rather monotonous. About all I have accomplished for my time spent here is as follows:

- (1) Read fourteen pocket novels.
- (2) Saw twenty-four movies (four class A, several class B, and the rest weren't classy at all).
- (3) Visited friend sick in bed twice.
- (4) Friend visited me in bed (not sick) eighteen times.
- (5) Looked in sixty-three store windows.
- (6) Helped do one cross-word puzzle.

The monotony of our lives was temporarily broken the other morning by one of those "Drama in Every Day Life" episodes which took place in our mess.

As the scene opened, four and twenty armen were seated about a push-button radio, listening in calm serenity to the day's chapter of "John's Other Wife." Suddenly the door burst open and a RAF "bod" (the hero of our little piece) rushed in excitedly and cast an agitated glance about the room—rushed out in again. By now we were somewhat agitated ourselves, for not only was the "bod" disturbing "John's Other Wife," but the door was creating quite a draught as well.

However, by now our hero had setted upon the object of his haste, a fire extinguisher (the five gallon family size) and made off with it. At first we were unconcerned for it was nearing the noon meal hour, and we thought they were only "watering the soup" again. We decided to investigate anyway.

Arriving on the scene we found great quantities of smoke issuing from the "Men's Room". We were too late to fan the flames for some inconsiderate person had already put the fire out. Several girls from the kitchen had braved the dense smoke and were huddled together peering curiously at the secret equipment in the "Gente Powder Room."

We were going to send an account of this near tragedy to the local press but decided against it. For instance how would you like to open the morning paper some day and be confronted with the headlines "Prompt Action Saves Men's Inner Sanctum From Flames"—or "Please Don't Burn Our Washroom Down."

Well, so much for the fire and flame; so I'll say good-bye for now, with best wishes to you all.
