Ford Rodgers Appointed Halton County Assessor

Trustee's Man's Salary \$3400 and \$700 Car Allowance—Increase in Salary to Clerk and Treasurer.

The most important item of business at the November meeting of Halton County Council was the appointment of a county assessor, which had been advertised in county newspapers for the three weeks previous. Nine applications were received and selection was made by vote, the law man being eliminated at each count. J. Ford Rodgers, a resident of Trafalgar Township, was the final choice of the council, and he will commence his new duties on Jan. 1st, 1946. His salary will be \$2400, plus a \$700 car allowance for the year.

Increases in salary were voted for two county officials and treasurer, Miss Margaret Maxted will now receive \$1700 and Clerk Wm. Deans, \$1350. The new salaries are retroactive to Nov. 1st, 1945.

Considerable discussion took place regarding the County Booklet, with which some members of the council were not altogether pleased. Mr. Robinson contended that, although the setup was not entirely to his liking he felt it should be remembered that the whole thing was more or less in the nature of an experiment and that when initial arrangements were being made for its compilation no one knew exactly what was wanted. Requests had come in from the C.P.E. for additional copies, and as it was felt that some municipalities might also wish for extra copies, particularly if the book could be revised, it was therefore moved that the Clerk be instructed to write the CNR, the C.P.E., the Ontario Government and each municipality with a request that they report on the number of additional copies of the County Booklet that would be required and the cost of same to be borne by the people who ordering them, and that a price be submitted to them.

SILVER MEDAL CERTIFICATE TO GRAHAM FARM MABEL

The Jersey cow, Graham Farm Mabel, —145155— bred and owned by Gerald R. Graham, Georgetown, Ont. has been awarded a Silver Medal Certificate by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. Mabel went on test as a Senior 2 year old and in 305 days produced 9,380 lbs. of milk, 481 lbs. of fat with an average test of 5.13%. She is a daughter of Mr. Graham's former herd sire, Silver Creek Valiant Eminence, a son of the famous show bull, Valiant of Oaklands, 4 times Grand Champion over Jersey Island and sire of 20 tested daughters and many champions. Mabel's dam is Royalist Ruby, a Gold Medal winner with 11,172 lbs. of milk, 611 lbs. of fat with 5.47% at 6 years in 308 days. She is a daughter of the Superior Str., Brampton Favorite Royalist.
