**C. F. Pickett, Georgetown, Tops Husking Corn Competition**

The results of the husking corn competition sponsored jointly by the Esqueping Agricultural Society and the Halton Crop Improvement Association have just been announced by Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock.

O. F. Pickett of Georgetown won the top award with a yield of 71.46 bushels of shelled corn per acre, and thereby wins the Canadian Industries Limited Special which entitles the winner to commercial fertilizer to the value of \$50.00. All yields were calculated on a 15% moisture content. Mr. Pickett's crop was of the DeKalb 65 variety. Spencer Wilson of Norval was runner-up with a yield of 60.7 bushels per acre from Punks 176 G variety. The other awards were as follows:

- 6th—Fred Nurse, Georgetown, yield 53.14 bus., Canada 356.
- 7th—Harvey Nurse, Georgetown, yield 52.45 bus., Pioneer 356.
- 8th—J. Alexander and Sons, Georgetown, yield 51.22 bus., DeKalb 65.
- 9th—T. J. Brownridge, Georgetown, yield 48.81 bus., DeKalb 65.
- 10th—K. C. Lindsay, Georgetown, yield 48.50 bus., DeKalb 65.
- 11th—W. E. Brecken, Freeman, yield 32.27 bus., DeKalb 65 variety.
- 12th—F. W. Ruddle and Sons, Georgetown, yield 31.87 bus., DeKalb 65 variety.

The average yield of the twelve competitors was 51.76 bus., which considering the unfavourable corn year is very good.

**FEDERATION FIELDMAN SHOWS VENEREAL DISEASE FILM**

The Ontario Department of Health is interested in a better health programme for the Province of Ontario, in order to restore health to sick persons, to prevent disease and to cure those afflicted.

In order to carry out a practical health system the citizens of the province must become better informed on both the cause of disease and the necessary steps toward prevention.

We believe that medical science has developed to the point of stamping out most of the terrible disease rampant in our province. Our doctors also agree it is only wisdom to enlighten the general public regarding this disease enemy. Doctors have told the writer a health educational program is long overdue.

To further assist and encourage the carrying out of a programme of education in the Province of Ontario the Dept. of Health has supplied the Halton County Federation of Agriculture Fieldman with a film "Know For Sure" and literature on Venereal Disease to be shown to the citizens of Halton. During the month of December and January, this film will be shown at every centre on the Halton County circuit. This is an opportunity for everyone in Halton to become better informed, and to discuss with their neighbor this most important question of health.

The medical health officers in each township are co-operating in this programme and will attend as many meetings as possible to discuss better health with those in attendance.

The centres in Esqueping Township are—Monday, Dec. 10, Dublin School. Tuesday, December 11, Glen Williams School. Wednesday, December 12th, Limehouse Hall. Thursday, December 13th, Quatre Bras School. Friday, December 14, Ashgrove School.

Miss Helen Blackburn held her mid-winter piano recital on Tuesday evening, December 8th, in the auditorium of the Public School.

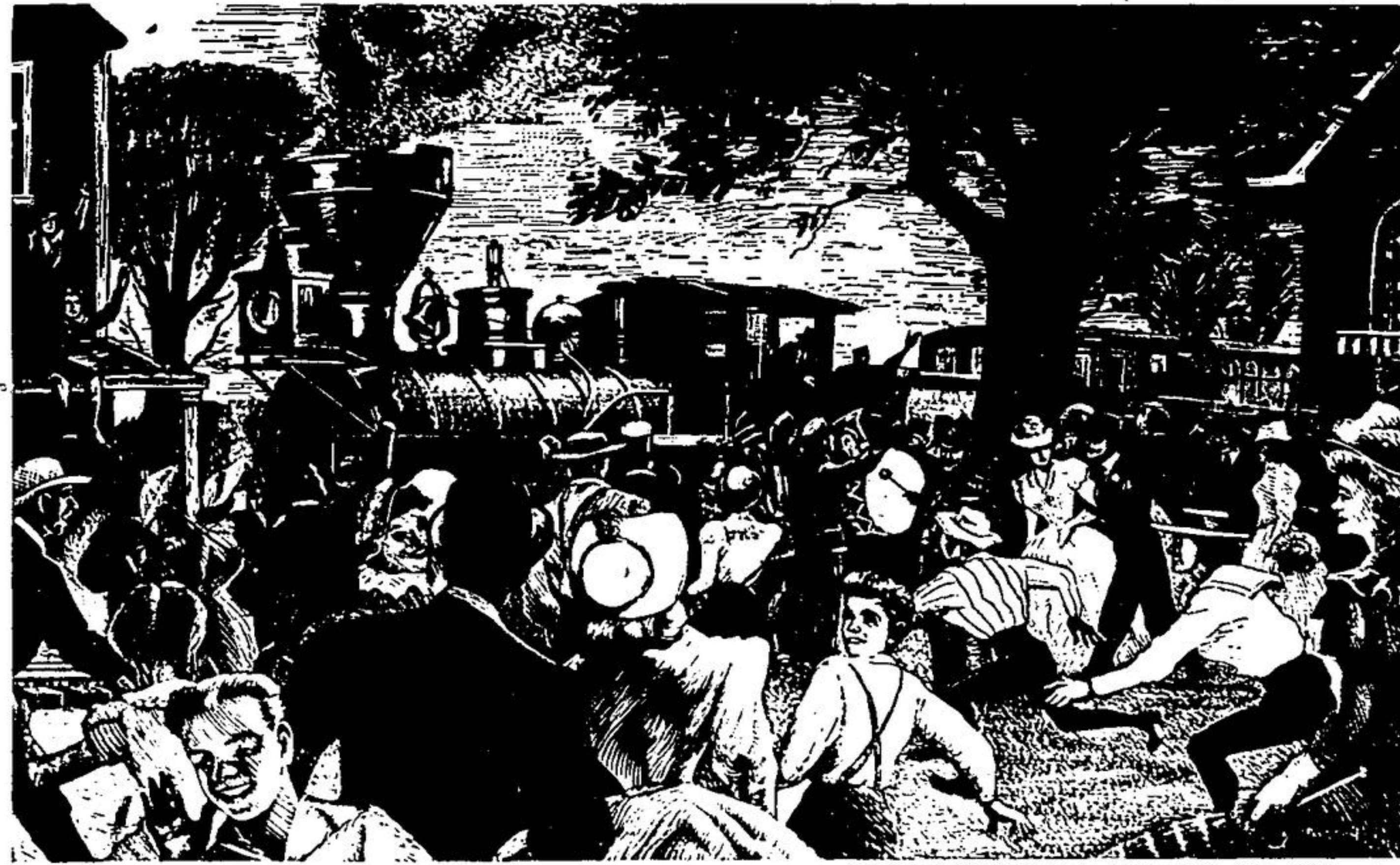
