## New Town Truck to be Purchased

The final meeting of the 1945 Council was held Monday evening in the Municipal Building with Mayor Harold Clove, Reeve K. R. MacDonald and C. Garfield McGilvray, Thos. L. Lyons, Jack Armstrong, Clifford Bradley, S. W. Orr and Wm. P. Thompson present.

One of the main items of business was the decision to purchase a new town truck, which had been budgeted for in the 1945 estimates. Three sealed tenders were opened, with the following offers: Georgetown Motors—Ford 1/2 ton, \$1047, allowance on Fargo 36, \$247; Scott's Garage, International 1/2 ton, \$1028, allowance, \$250; Speight's Garage, Fargo 1/2 ton, \$1107.50, allowance \$100. A motion was passed calling for the purchase of the International from Scott's Garage.

A letter from a returned serviceman, Albert Reeve, offering to purchase a lot owned by the town at the corner of Ewing and Arletta Street for \$100, resulted in a considerable difference of opinion among the council and ended in a three-way deadlock. C. R. Armstrong and Bradley moved that it be offered to Mr. Reeve at \$100. An amendment was moved by C. R. Orr and Lyons that the lot be offered for sale at \$150 to any returned man and if more than one offer was received, that the name be drawn from a hat. A second amendment, moved by Mr. Gilvray and MacDonald asked that the original offer be accepted. When votes were tallied, all motions failed to secure the necessary majority as movers and seconders all voted for their own motions and Cr. Thompson was the only outside supporter of the McGilvray-MacDonald motion.

Correspondence included a letter from the Local Council of Women, asking that the curfew law be enforced, requiring juveniles to be off the streets by 9.30 p.m. County Council informed the town that additional copies of the County Advertising booklet could be obtained at cost price of 20c to 30c a copy. The Hydro is to be asked to put in two new street lights, one behind the Public school on Victoria St. and the other near the Harrison residence on Ontario St. Mr. Art Scott notified Council that a snowplow had been purchased by him and was ready for action when required.

It was decided to proclaim Boxing Day, December 26th, a public holiday in Georgetown. A grant of \$600 was made to the Fire Brigade, and the clerk was authorized to pay the statutory one-mill grant of \$1322 to the Board of Parks Management.

First and second reading was given to the by-law authorizing the installation of a sewerage system at an estimated cost of \$193,947, and it was decided to write to the two Halton members asking if any government assistance was contemplated for public works.

Cr. Sid Orr will head a delegation from Council which is in Toronto today interviewing Queen's Park with regard to locating a second bank in Georgetown. The town has been served by only one bank since the Bank of Montreal branch was closed down during the war and present and anticipated growth of the town merits additional banking facilities, it is felt.

The Mayor mentioned the plans for a home-coming reception for the Lorne Scots Regiment, which will be held in Brampton when the regiment arrives from overseas later this month. As the date is not yet known, preliminary arrangements only can be made, and the matter was left with the Mayor to make any necessary arrangements.

## REV. HAROLD TOYE LEADS INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS DISCUSSION

First in a series of three open discussions on "Industrial Relations" was held at the United Church last Sunday afternoon. The discussions are sponsored by the newly-formed Men's Club at the Church and the guest speaker on Sunday was Rev. E. Harold Toye, secretary of the Religion-Labour Foundation.

Mr. Toye, speaking on "the Church's Point of View," gave some interesting sidelights on his work with the Foundation which comprises representatives of the Protestant Roman Catholic and Jewish faiths, as well as representatives of all major labour groups, among them being that of a fact-finding committee in labour management disputes, and a co-ordinating influence between agriculture and industry. In the United States, the organization has placed chaplains in different business firms, who take jobs in factories and serve as religious advisors to the staff. The Foundation has given religious groups a chance to get to know labour, while giving the latter an opportunity to express its views from the pulpit.

Second and third in the discussion series will feature a representative from the Canadian Manufacturers' Association this Sunday, and Mr. Charles Millard, organizer of the C. I. O. Steelworkers' Union on the following Sunday.
