**Five Services Represented at Legion Initiation Thursday**

34 More Veterans Join Growing Ranks of Branch 128—Dance and Entertainment Provided Gay Evening at Legion Hall.

Boosting the growing ranks of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, 36 new members were initiated into the Branch at a ceremony last Thursday evening in the local Legion Hall. T. F. Grievé was in charge of the initiation ceremony and acted as sergeant-at-arms. Assisting him were Deputy Zone Commander, Fred McCartney as acting president, Harry Savings as past president and Herb Harlow, 1st vice-president; Charles Davis and Henry Preston, standard-bearers; Alex. Taylor, James Murphy and Charles Parton, who explained the Legion emblems to the initiates.

A unique feature of the ceremony was that the group of newcomers represented five of the "six" Canadian services in the past war, and as representative of these were Lt. Col. Jean Tennant, OWAO; Wren Sarah Blick; OSM Fred Toot, army; Petty Officer Roy Preston, RCNVR; and LAC Alva Grievé, ROAF. W. E. Nodwell, secretary of the Board of Trade, was on hand to take a picture of this group, with a view to incorporating it in a planned advertising booklet for Georgetown. The admittance of two new lady members makes a total of four now in the branch, Mrs. T. F. Grievé and Mrs. W. Mendham, already being members.

The Grievé family also has the distinction of being the only father, mother and son combination in the branch. Mr. and Mrs. Grievé are both charter members of the branch. Miss Tennant is the fourth of her family to join the Legion, her father, Mr. Sam Tennant and brothers, Bill and Bernard all being members.

President S. P. Chapman spoke a few words of welcome to the new members and welcomed them to the comradeship of the Branch. Col. G. B. S. Cousens also had some announcements to make concerning plans for welcoming home the Lorne Scots this week and said arrangements had been made to provide transportation to Brampton for the big day.

Adding the newcomers to the 43 were initiated last month, makes a grand total of 79 who have joined the Legion in the last two months, and applications are being received every day, pointing to another large group in the near future.

Following the official ceremony, wives and sweethearts of old and new members were invited to a social and entertainment, which had been arranged by Entertainment Committee chairman Sam Tennant.

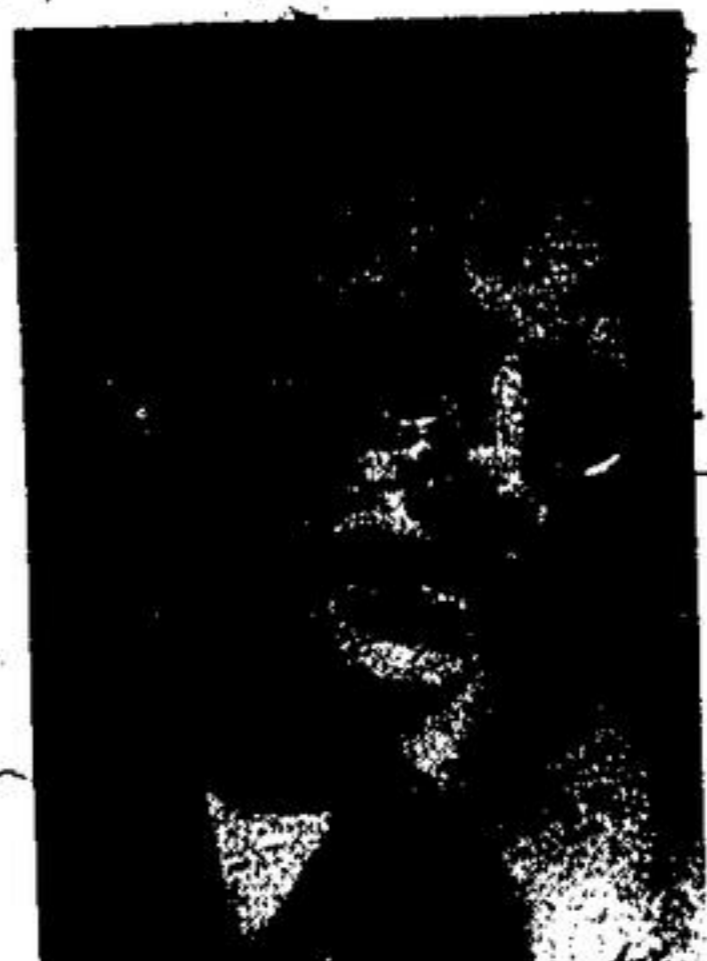
