Mrs. May Keddie BROOK, who was born in Oshawa on August 1, 1867, and spent many years of her life there, passed away on December 21st.

Mrs. Brooke was educated in Oshawa schools and after graduating from High School accepted a position in Montreal with the H. H. Lang Co., making her home there for several years.

Returning from Montreal, she was for some time associated with General Motors. She was a devoted member of Simcoe Street United Church and in Oshawa as in Montreal her most absorbing interest was a large class of growing girls in the Sunday School.

She guided her pupils in their spiritual life through the years into young womanhood and many of them were among her dearest friends in later life.

Following her marriage to F. W. Brooke in 1921 her home was for a time in Toronto and later in Georgetown, where Mr. Brooke had been a merchant tailor and later a traveller in the United States for the Wrigley Company.

After her husband's death she returned to Oshawa, making her home with her sister, Miss Jean Keddie. Her friendly Christian character endeared her to all who knew her and many of her friends treasure choice literary gems from her gifted mind.

Mrs. Brooke leaves a sorrowing and most devoted sister Jean and two brothers, Will in Ottawa, and Charlie in Vancouver as well as a large circle of cousins and close friends who keenly feel their sore bereavement.

The funeral was held from the Luke McIntosh Funeral Home on Monday, Dec. 23rd with interment in Oshawa Union Cemetery. Rev. A. D. Cornett conducted the services.
