Georgetown, Norval and Glen Lads Play Under Sponsorship of G.R.C.

A six-team midget hockey league, under the sponsorship of the Georgetown Recreational Council has swung into action and promises to give a full two months of hockey to 16-year-olds and under. The Hockey Committee of the G.R.C., composed of Alf Sykes, Jack Brill and Jim Sargent have been busy this past month lining up teams, securing equipment and organizing what promises to be a big factor in the future big league Georgetown Hockey teams, for it is an old axiom that "practice makes perfect" and the present scarcity of local hockey talent is due for the most part to neglect of fostering midget and juvenile teams.

The Board of Parks Management has given the arena free of charge for the games which will be played Tuesday and Thursday nights and Saturday mornings. Children 18 and under will be admitted free to all midget games, while a small charge of 15c will be made for adults to meet incidental expenses. At the conclusion of the regular schedule, semi-final play-offs between 1st and 3rd and 2nd and 4th teams will be home-and-home games, with the two top teams concluding with a best 2 out of 3 series.
