First Meeting of Halton County Council

Committees Named at Inaugural Session on Tuesday — Other Appointments Made

At the inaugural meeting of Halton County Council, the following gentlemen took their places and made up the personnel of the 1946 Council. Action—Reeve Chas. Kirkness. Burlington—Reeve Norman Craig. Deputy-Reeve, E. W. Smith. Georgetown — Reeve K. R. MacDonald. Milton—Reeve Dr. C. H. Heslop. Oakville—Reeve C. V. Hillmer, Deputy-Reeve, Alfred E. Whitaker. Esquesing—Reeve G. W. Murray. Deputy-Reeve, George E. Cleave. Nassagaweya — Reeve Lloyd Crawford. Nelson — Reeve Mary Pettit, Deputy-Reeve Elmer Foster. Trafalgar — Reeve W. H. Biggar. Deputy-Reeve, W. S. Hall. Messrs. Kirkness, Crawford and Foster were new faces at the Council but Mr. Hall was an old friend, returned to the fold, as it were.

Nominations for the office of Warden were then called for with the following results: Mr. K. R. MacDonald, Georgetown, nominated by Heslop and Crawford. Mrs. Mary Pettit, nominated by Murray and Cleave. Mr. Norman Craig, nominated by Smith and Whitaker. Mr. Chas. Hillmer, nominated by Craig and MacDonald.

Following the close of nominations, Mrs. Pettit and Messrs. MacDonald and Craig asked that their names be withdrawn, thus making the election of Mr. Charles Hillmer to be unanimous for Warden of the County for year 1946.

Also present at the Council were two of the retiring members of Council, Mr. J. M. McDonald and Norman Gilbert, who spoke briefly in congratulating the new Warden. Every member of the council was then given an opportunity to express a few words of welcome to the Warden and new members of the council. Minutes of the last meeting were then read and Dr. Heslop being appointed as Chairman of the Striking Committee, council adjourned to await the report of the committee.

The Striking Committee recommended the following appointments be made to Standing Committees for the year 1946.

Finance—Craig, Hill, Cleave, Heslop and Kirkness. Education and School Nursing—Mrs. Pettit, MacDonald, Craig, Kirkness, Cleave. Printing—MacDonald, Whitaker, Foster, Biggar.

County Buildings—Biggar, Heslop, Smith, Cleave, Whitaker. Hospital Accounts—Murray, Mrs. Pettit, Whitaker, Hill. Railways, Legislation, Agriculture, Reforestation—Crawford, Biggar, Foster, Murray.

Good Roads—Heslop, Pettit, Biggar, Murray, Crawford. The first named on each committee to be chairman of that committee. Other appointments were as follows:

Commissioner to the House of Refuge—Chas. Hillmer and Dr. Heslop. To Old Age Pensions and Mothers' Allowance Board—Mrs. D. Hartley and Mr. Craig. To Milton High School Board—Edward Mahon, 1946-48. To Georgetown High School Board—John Bingham, 1946-48. To Burlington High School Board—Gordon J. Campbell, 1946-48.

It was moved by Heslop and Pettit that the Warden and clerk submit to the Minister of Highways, that during the year 1945, there was expended on the county road system the sum of \$136,434.14 and request the statutory grant on that amount as provided by the Highway Improvement Act. Carried.

Permission was given for the Committee on Printing to call for tenders for copies of county minutes and reports. Moved by Hill and Pettit that we pay the Good Roads Association the regular fee of \$15 for 1946 and that the Road Committee and County Engineer be a delegation to attend convention on Feb. 26 and 27 and that expenses up to \$100 be allowed. Carried.

By-law to appoint members of the county board of audit was passed. The subject of an office for the county assessor was discussed. Dr. Heslop mentioned an office was already available in the Bank of Commerce building. It was agreed this should be rented.

It was moved by Craig and Whitaker that our county assessor, Mr. Rogers, be given authority to visit other counties to inspect their systems of assessment. Carried. The members of the council opposed to the revised system of county assessing were asked to talk it over again with their council and report at the next meeting. Council adjourned to meet January 22 at 1:30 p.m.

It was decided at the annual meeting of Union Presbyterian Church to embark on a beautification program around the church by fixing the grounds and putting in a lawn. The meeting was held on Monday noon, January 14th, and seventy-five church members sat down to a delicious dinner before the business meeting. With the year's receipts amounting to \$15,502.1, the church had a balance of \$206 on hand at the start of the new year.

The Sunday School report showed yearly receipts of \$108.15, and the Mission Band, \$25.53, most of which was raised by selling Christmas cards. Donald Anderson is president, with Douglas Marshall, secretary, and Bill Shuk, Treasurer.

The Young People's Society, headed by John McNab, president, and Carson Watson secretary, had receipts of \$81.21 during the year. Church officers for 1946 are: Board of Management, F. L. Thompson, chairman; C. Anderson, Ben Young, Fraser McDonald, Howard Dolson, Wilfred Leslie and Eric Leslie; Albert Dolson, secretary and F. H. Lyons, treasurer.

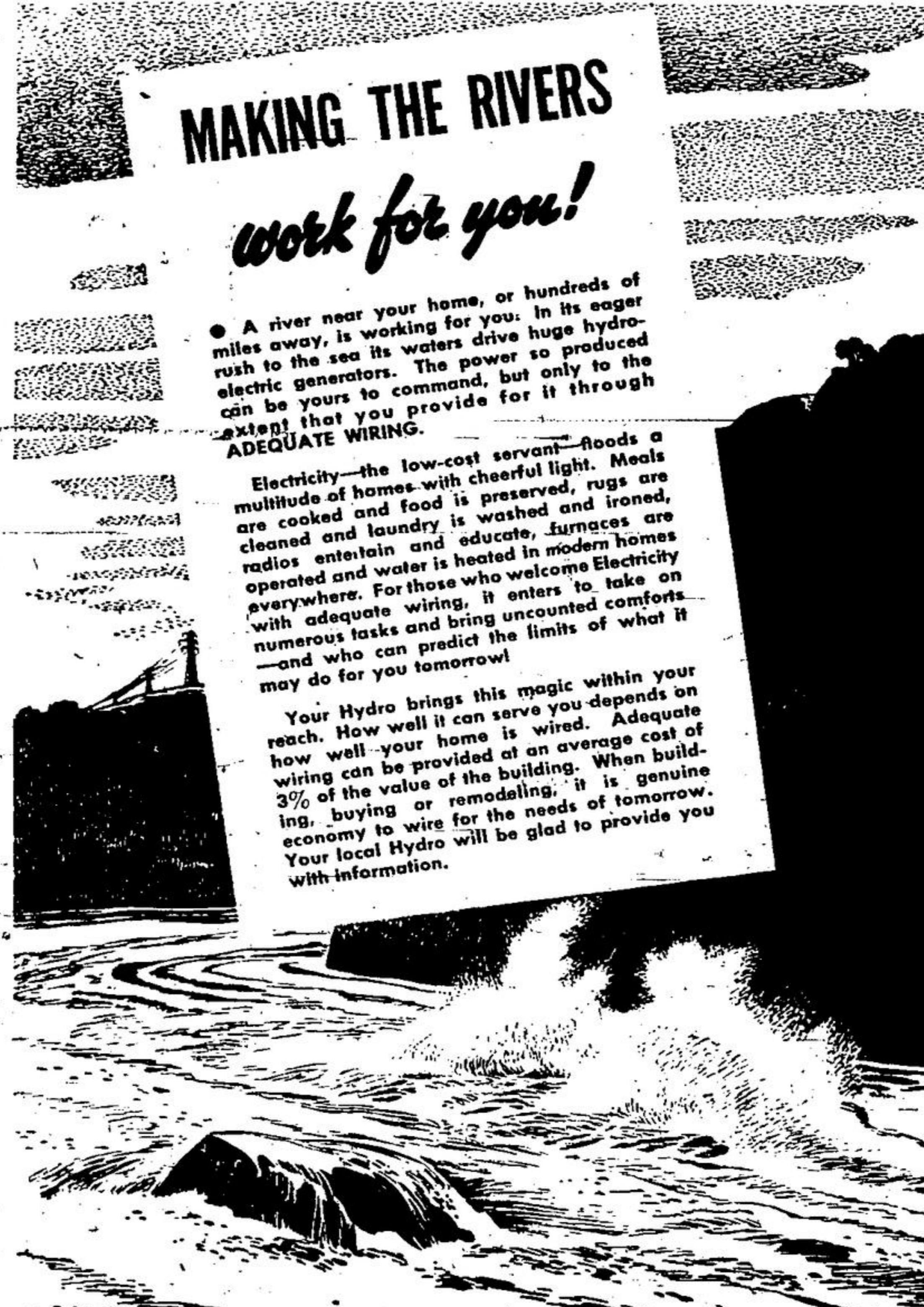
