

PLASTICS

Down through the years, article after article, made from nothing new, appeared and came into regular use which expanded as improvements and refinements were developed.

This growing tendency to employ commonly known, basic materials received tremendous impetus when Man undertook to explore the field of chemistry. He discovered that these are made up of links or chains of atoms which could be broken down or combined in differing ways, and that such combinations produced new materials having a wide variety of uses.

To date, about thirty basic plastics have been developed which lend themselves to hundreds of formulations. Meanwhile, chemists and engineers are continuing their research and their is sound reason for believing they will develop many additional plastics materials which will be put to thousands of uses.

THIS AND THAT IN SPORT

THIS HAS CERTAINLY been one of those "old fashioned" winters — plenty of cold weather and snow, with lots of skating, hockey and other sports. The local Arena has been a hive of activity since December (with the exception of a few days when we had the usual January thaw) with Intermediate, midget and juvenile hockey, and free skating two nights a week after school, for the children, and Saturday afternoon has been open house for anyone wanting to skate. The curlers, too, have had a busy and steady season. Last week members of the Club paid a friendly visit to the Hillsburgh curlers, and a grand 'spell was had by all. The Club league games are progressing nicely and will soon be into the play-offs stage. Almost fifty curlers signed up this year.

WE HOPE LOCAL citizens appreciate the fact that they have one of the best arenas in Ontario. When one stops to realize how some towns (and cities too) have to get by with outdoor rinks entirely, we can consider ourselves very fortunate, and owe a debt of gratitude to those public-spirited citizens who fostered this project — and which has now fallen into the hands of the town to direct its destiny in the best interests of all the people of Georgetown. Let us make as much use as possible out of this publicly-owned institution.

THE TOWN OF Hespeler will ask the ratepayers there to vote shortly on a by-law calling for the erection of a new \$40,000 arena. Plans for an artificial rink at \$85,000 were dropped due to the increased cost. Hespeler have hockey teams this winter but no ice on which to play their home games. We understand Guelph will also make a bid for an arena in that city.

WE HAD HOPED to look up some figures on attendance records at the arena for hockey matches, but time seemed to march on and we didn't get around to it. However, we believe the crowd last Friday night at the Milton-Georgetown game was one in the high brackets. There were 1283 paid admissions. We can remember back to the time when Georgetown had a bank-up junior team in the play-offs with Kitchener when the turnstiles would have clicked off 1164 had we had any. But we understand that shortly after the arena was built there was an attendance even greater than those figures on one occasion. Acton reported 1511 paid admissions at the Acton-Georgetown game in Acton the week previous.

CONSIDERABLE change has taken place in the Intermediate set-up since the first few games. Teams at the bottom have come up to replace top teams and this makes it difficult to say just which teams will make the four play-off spots. At the present time Orangeville are still holding the league leadership with Acton a close second. Georgetown is down in fifth position with Fergus edging them by one point. The local team has three games to play; should they win all three they will be in definitely. Should they drop one game, and Elora triumph over Acton in their game tonight (which is not likely) Georgetown can hang up their skates. Let's keep our fingers crossed and watch the summary. We'd like to see more hockey this winter. Fergus play the final league game here next Monday night, Feb. 11th.
