

Burning of Mortgage Features United Church Annual Meeting

Burning of a \$1600 mortgage, the last payment on which was made last year by the Woman's Association, featured the annual meeting of the congregation of Georgetown United Church, which was held on Monday evening, February 11th. The mortgage was incured in 1933. Rev. R. C. Todd, Dr. A. McAllister, clerk of the Session, and chairman of the Board of Trustees, and Mrs. Fred Sinclair and Mrs. Howard Kentner, president and treasurer of the W. A. officiated at the burning.

Following dinner, served by the ladies of the church, the business meeting was convened, with Rev. R. C. Todd as chairman, and John Bird as secretary. Current funds of the church showed a surplus at the year's end. All church groups showed a favourable financial picture. Plans for the large-scale renovation of the church are still under consideration. Architect's specifications are completed and tenders are being called for.

During the year, two new groups were formed in the church—the Men's Club, which meets Sunday afternoons, and is presenting an excellent series of guest speakers, and the 50-60 club, an organization for the young married couples in the congregation.

Life memberships in the Board of Session were conferred on J. W. Kennedy, J. D. Godfrey and A. H. Baird, H. C. Wrigglesworth, Harvey Clarke, William Deans, E. L. Arnold, E. J. Johnston and Graham Farnell were elected elders. Elected to the Committee of Stewards were Ernest Burgrae, Hector Bird, William Deans, Frank Tyler, A. Prouse, Walter Richardson, and E. B. Swackhamer.

Membership in the church showed an increase of 13, present membership standing at 471.

Betty's father is Scott Brown, goalkeeper of the Elora intermediate hockey team. The sporting fraternity express their deepest sympathy.

THE GEORGETOWN Curling Club members were hosts to two rinks from Hillsburg last Thursday night. Hillsburg won the four games played, and afterwards all were treated to hot beef sandwiches with all the trimmings. A number of local rinks had played in Hillsburg the previous week. Local curlers also participated in the bonspiel at Erin on Monday and a team composed of P. Cleave, W. McDowell, Frank Petch and George Burt were edged out of the play-offs, although they had three good games during the day.

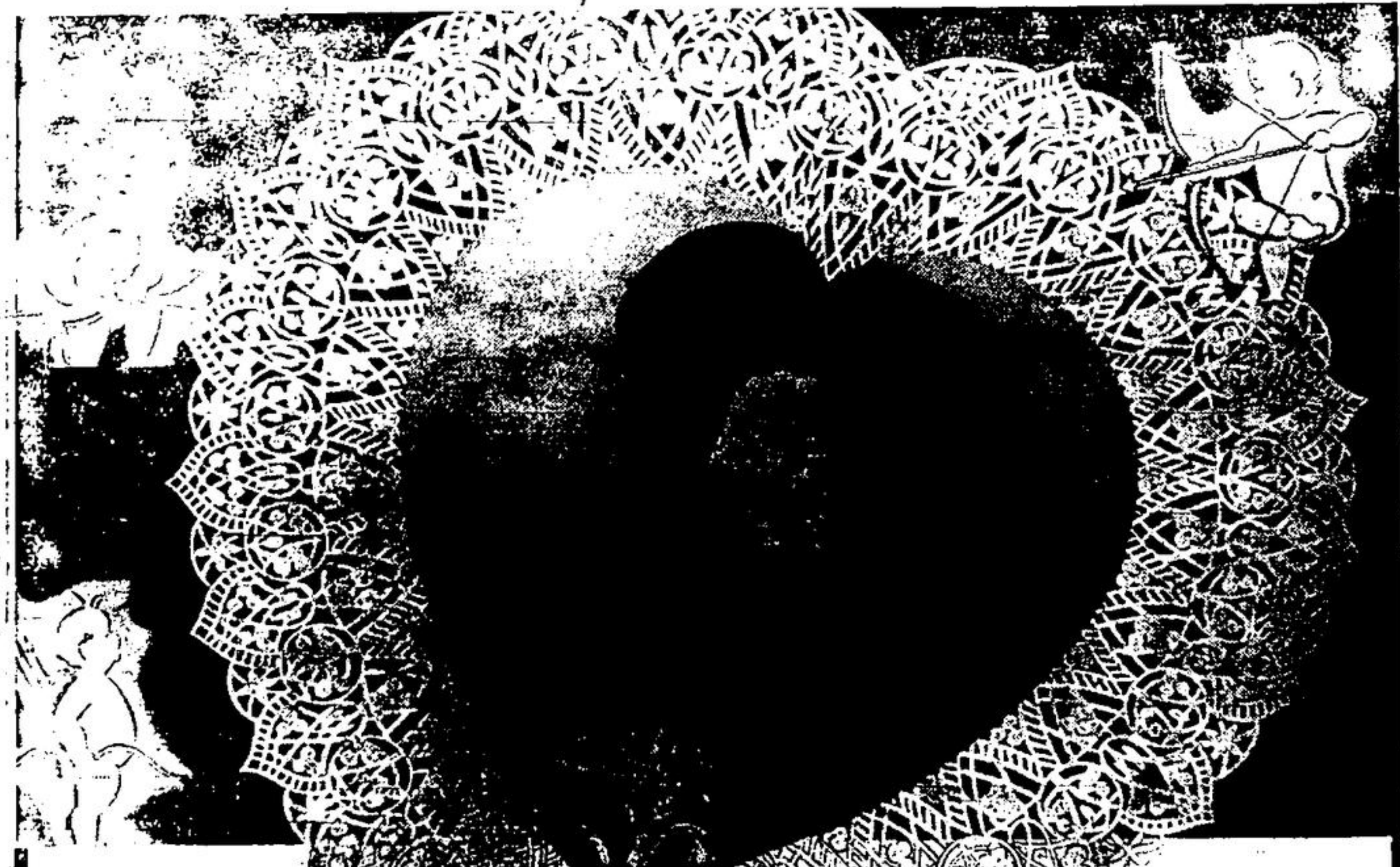
