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### GARAGE OPERATORS MEET IN MILTON

The February meeting of the Garage Operator's Association, Halton Branch was held in the Oddfellows Hall in Milton on the evening of Feb. 4th. President Red Waumsley was in the chair.  
The Industrial Standards Act was thoroughly discussed in regard to its application to the garage trade. It was brought out that the Industry and Labour Board would call a Labour Conference to set up hours of sale of gasoline and that the petition of Essex County for regulations in this regard had now been officially turned down, due to the difference of opinion of the City Operators from those in the county. It was therefore decided that if the branch wishes to "come under the Act" a different proposal would have to be presented. Following this through it was moved that Larry Hastings of Head Office be invited to the March meeting in order that a full report on the applications of other branches be presented to the membership, at which time the members could decide what they wished to do.  
The Secretary's and Treasurer's reports were adopted as read. Complaints were received from several members concerning repairs being done by individuals without the proper licences. It was also advanced that the Department of Labor had issued mechanics certificates without the consent of the Apprenticeship board. These two matters were to be referred to Head Office for their attention.  
It was also brought out that there were too many service calls out on the road to which a service truck was sent only to find that the party that had phoned in had left. The chief complaint in this regard was that one of the larger Brewing Companies, maintaining a free service from their trucks to motorists in trouble. The members expressed the view that they had no objection to this provided that a garage had not been called. The Secretary was instructed to write to this firm and ask for their co-operation in this matter.

### CAMERON WILSON PRESIDENT NEWLY ORGANIZED MILTON JUNIOR FARMERS

The three weeks' short course in agriculture held in Milton during the month of January, culminated with the formation of the Milton Junior Farmers' Association. Plans have already been made to hold monthly meetings, the first of which is to be held at the home of Robt. W. Ford, Jr., near Omagh on Feb. 19th.  
Mr. H. C. Morris, Manager of the Milton Branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia is to discuss with the young men, "Banking Services", while Wm. Brain of Norval, is to tell of his experiences in Calf Club work. For the joint programme with the young ladies, four young men namely Jack Marchmont, Cedric Harrop, Wm. Lawson and Robert Ford Jr. are scheduled to debate the subject: "Resolved that in each Township, all Public Schools should be placed under a single board of trustees."  
We understand that all rural young people of Milton district are invited to attend this first meeting. It is anticipated at this time, that a Junior Homemaker Group or Junior Institute will also be formed.

Colonel Lent suffered a severe heart attack in England in November, but had recovered sufficiently to make the trip home to Canada last month on the hospital ship, Lady Nelson.  
A prominent member of the Lorne Scots Regiment, he volunteered for overseas duty and went to England in 1940, later serving in North Africa, Sicily and Italy. Brampton town solicitor at time of enlistment, this office had been filled in his absence by Miss Sybil Bennett, K.C., who also took charge of Col. Lent's practice while he was overseas.
