**G.R.C. Hockey Play-Offs

Upsets featured the final play-off game of the Midget and Juvenile hockey series sponsored by Georgetown Recreational Council, which were held in the Arena last Thursday night. The Juvenile game went to the Owls, one of three Georgetown teams in a four-team league, who defeated the Normal Pirates 1-0 with a goal by Clarence Burns in the second ten-minute overtime stretch. The Normal team was highly touted to win, and though they played a good game, didn't seem to have what it takes when it came to the scoring plays.

An even greater surprise was the first defeat of the year for the Clerg Red Wings at the hands of the second place Maple Leafs. The two teams were an even match and provided plenty of thrills as the play saw-sawed back and forth. The Clerg "kid line", which was much superior in league play seemed to have an off night and didn't click in their usual manner. Hamilton was the goal-getter for the Leafs with an assist by Louth to win the game 1-0 in the second period.

Third upset was that of Gus Bodnar, one of three Maple Leaf hockey stars who added a touch of the big-time in their capacity as referees. Referee Bodnar was spilled by a juvenile lad in one of the rushes, and looked mighty surprised when he got back on his skates. Caye Stewart, N.H.L. top scorer and Bob Goldham, Georgetown's Maple Leaf defenseman, completed the triumvirate. Jack Thompson handled the announcing chore over the loud speaker.

At the conclusion of the midget game, the Midget cup was presented to the winning team on behalf of its donor, Mr. John D. Kelly, by G.R.C. president, E. V. MacCormack. Sandwiches and coffee were served upstairs following the game by the Recreational Council to the visiting hockey stars and other guests.

Alternates are "Bungy" Ward, no need of introduction there; Charlie Tyler, a former Actonite now residing here. Walt Richardson and Joe Hall are still on the list, but admit they have slipped a lot and do not wish to play unless they are needed. A fine spirit, boys, you have done your bit in the past.

A FINE DISPLAY was the Midget N.H.L. play-offs last week, under auspices of the G.R.C. The "kids" really gave us a thrill and when we coined the phrase "support your stars of tomorrow" by attending their games today, we didn't expect to see 700 or 800 people in attendance. It was grand, folks! Let's give the G.R.C. our whole-hearted support. It is the coming thing for Ontario — and our boys and girls.

WE HATE to do this folks, but couldn't let the opportunity pass. Did you read what one sport writer said in the Acton Free Press last week. Here it is "Our three stars in the Acton — Georgetown play-off — Townsley, Woods, Kentner." We began to wonder who did win that game, and if Art Hurst really did score those three goals. Nuf said!! See you next year again, Acton. — we hope!
