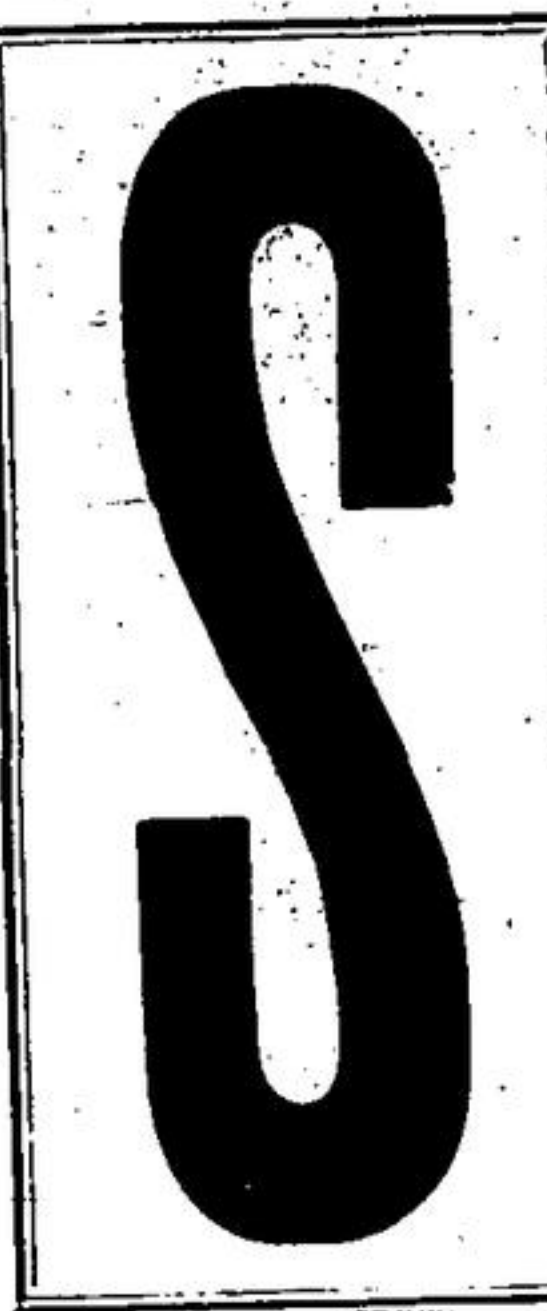

Gibbons brought up the question of a town truck purchase which had been the subject of much debate last year until a decision was finally made to buy a new one-half ton truck. Cr. Gibbons thought the town needed a 2 or 3-ton truck, with a view to doing its own snow plowing and garbage collection. Mayor Cleave thought the present system was cheaper and more efficient, and a majority opinion seemed to back him up in this. Striking of the tax rate was deferred due to the lateness of the hour, to a special meeting tomorrow night. All indications point to a higher mill rate this year, in view of all the demands for increased public service and the proposed sewerage installation.
